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# 2021-22 Phase Two: The Needs Assessment for Schools Understanding Continuous Improvement: The Needs Assessment for Schools

The Needs Assessment Diagnostic will facilitate the use of multiple sources of data to determine the current reality and establish a foundation for decision-making around school goals and strategies. Once completed, the diagnostic will lead to priorities to be addressed in the comprehensive school improvement plan to build staff capacity and increase student achievement. The needs assessment is to be conducted annually as an essential part of the continuous improvement process and precedes the development of strategic goals (i.e. desired state).

While the focus of continuous improvement is student performance, the work must be guided by the aspects of teaching and learning that affect performance. An effective improvement process should address the contributing factors creating the learning environment (inputs) and the performance data (outcomes).

#### Protocol

Good schools are built on collaborative culture. At Crossroads, various stakeholder groups meet to discuss, plan and implement continuous improvement. These groups meet regularly. Our SBDM Council (Julie Wright, Kelly Siegel, Kim Thomas, Kim Baker, Jorge Barrera, Jennifer Taylor, Mandy Turner) meets once monthly. Crossroads PTA meets monthly, as well, and maintains constant communication with both the administration, staff and parents to communicate needs. Our Leader in Me Action teams (Leadership, Culture, Academic) meet once a month in the areas of Professional Learning, Student Learning, Family Learning, Leadership Environment, Shared Leadership, Social Service, Leadership Events, Student Led

Achievement, Schoolwide Goal Achievement, and Empowering Learning and Instruction. In addition, our teachers meet in grade level PLCs with special education teachers weekly. Our Leadership Team (Julie Wright, Lauren Manion, Leigh Ann Lowery and Debbie Whitsell) meet weekly on Mondays at noon to review various needs of the school and make plans for upcoming staff meetings and Bullitt Days. Agendas and minutes maintained in the google drive and are reviewed regularly to ensure action steps are being taken. In addition PLC notes are monitored for the use of the 4 questions and implementation of the instructional process.

#### **Trends**

2. Analyzing data trends from the previous two academic years, which academic, cultural and behavioral measures remain significant areas for improvement?

#### **Example of Trends**

- The number of behavior referrals increased from 204 in 2019-20 to 288 in 2020-21.
- From 2018 to 2020, the school saw an 11% increase in novice scores in reading among students in the achievement gap.

- Teacher attendance rate was 84% for the 2020-21 academic year.
- Survey results and perception data indicated 62% of the school's teachers received adequate professional development.

School Safety Report

Pursuant to KRS 158.162, the local board of education shall require the school council or, if none exists, the principal in each school to adopt an emergency plan that must be utilized in case of fire, severe weather, earthquake, or a building lockdown and that: establishes evacuation routes; identifies the best available severe weather zones; develops earthquake protocols for students; and, develops and adheres to practices controlling access to the school building. The emergency plan shall be annually reviewed by the council, principal, and first responders and revised as

In addition to the emergency plan requirements in KRS 158.162, KRS 158.164 requires the local board of education to direct the school council or, if none exists, the principal in each school to establish procedures to perform a building lockdown and to invite local law enforcement to assist in establishing lockdown procedures.

KRS 158.162 also requires the emergency plan be discussed with all school staff prior to the first instructional day of the school year and provided, along with a diagram of the facility, to appropriate first responders. Further, the principal in each school shall conduct, at a minimum, the following emergency response drills within the first 30 instructional days of the school year and again during the month of January: one severe weather drill, one earthquake drill, and one lockdown drill. In addition, required fire drills shall be conducted according to administrative regulations promulgated by the Department of Housing, Buildings and Construction.

Questions Related to the Adoption and Implementation of the Emergency Plan 1. Has the school council or, where applicable, principal adopted an emergency plan in accordance with local board policy and in compliance with the specifications in KRS 158.162(3)?

If the answer is "no", please explain in the comment box. Please note that Senate Bill 1 (2019) and Senate Bill 8 (2020) amended KRS 158.162(3)(d) to require, for example, classroom doors remain closed and locked during instructional time (with limited exceptions) as well as classroom doors with windows be equipped with material to quickly cover the window during a building lockdown. 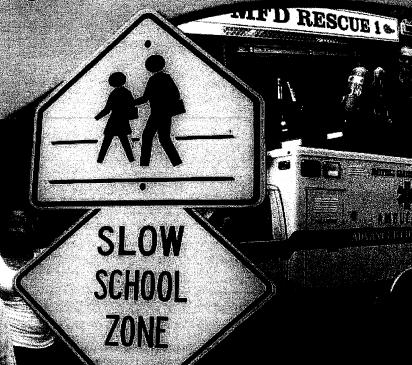

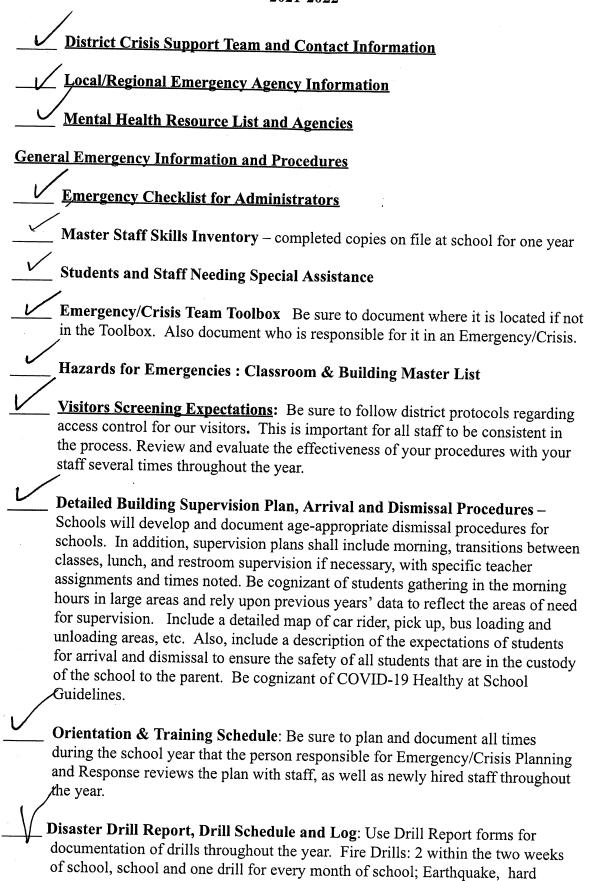

The Building Principal will be the planning coordinator and will involve the necessary staff to accomplish the objectives. Faculty responsibility for implementation of the plan will be assigned by position. Assignment of duties to specific individuals does not relieve other school employees from acting in their areas of responsibility in emergencies. The principal or building leadership shall discuss the emergency plan with all school staff prior to the first instructional day of each school year and shall document the time and date of any discussion. A chain of command will be created and will include names and phone numbers of the persons to succeed the principal in the event of his/her absence or incapacitation.

Emergency Procedures are standard, clear directives that may be implemented across a variety of emergency situations. The principal, or designee, will activate appropriate emergency procedures, based on the situation. Emergency procedures are outlined below.

#### **EVACUATION**

(For use when conditions outside are safer than inside)

#### When announcement is made or alarm sounded:

- Take the closest and safest way out as posted (use secondary route if primary route is blocked or hazardous)
- Take class roster for student accounting
- Assist those needing special assistance
- Do not stop for student/staff belongings
- Go to designated Assembly Area
- Check for injuries
- Take attendance; report according to Student Accounting and Release procedures
- BE QUIET! Wait for further instructions

#### **REVERSE EVACUATION**

(For use when conditions inside are safer than outside)

#### When the announcement is made:

- Move students and staff inside as quickly as possible
- Assist those needing special assistance
- Report to classroom
- Check for injuries
- Take attendance; report according to Student Accounting and Release procedures
- BE QUIET!! Wait for further instructions

#### SHELTER IN PLACE

(For use in chemical release scenarios)

#### When the announcement is made:

- Turn off HVAC System
- Students are to be cleared from the hills IMMEDIATELY and to report to the nearest available classroom or other designated location.
- Assist those needing special assistance
- Close and tape all windows and doors and seal the gap between the bottom of the door and floor (chemical release)
- Take attendance; report according to Student Accounting and Release procedures
- Do not allow anyone to leave the classroom
- Stay away from all doors and windows
- BE QUIET! Wait for further instructions

#### **LOCKDOWN**

(For use to protect building occupants from potential dangers in the building) **Note**: school-specific lockdown procedures should be developed by school officials and local law enforcement officials. Please see "Considerations When Developing a School Lockdown Policy" for additional information.

#### When the announcement is made:

- Students are to be cleared from the halls immediately and to report to nearest available classroom

### DROP, COVER AND HOLD

(For use in an earthquake or other imminent danger to building or immediate surroundings)

- HOLD on to the table or desk legs, and maintain present location/position
- Assist those needing special assistance
- BE QUIET! Wait for further instructions

#### SEVERE WEATHER SAFE AREA

(For use in severe weather emergencies)

#### When an announcement is made or alarm sounded:

- Take the closest, safest route to shelter in designated safe areas (use secondary route if primary route is blocked or dangerous)
- Occupants of portable classrooms shall move to the main building to designated safe areas
- Take class roster for student accounting
- Take attendance; report according to Student Accounting and Release procedures
- Assist those needing special assistance
- Do not stop for student/staff belongings
- Close all doors
- Remain in a safe area until the "all clear" is given
- BE QUIET! Wait for further instructions

# **Emergency Team "Toolbox"**

A member of the Emergency Response Team should be assigned to keep the toolbox updated (change batteries, update phone numbers, etc.). The toolbox should be portable and readily accessible for use in an emergency.

# **BCPS Visitor Protocol for All Schools**

The person or persons responsible for controlling the access into the school building needs to view their job as the <u>first level of security</u> for the school and thus <u>take this responsibility very</u> seriously.

<u>Communication and Visibility</u> - make certain that the school's visitor check-in policy is widely publicized that anyone (and everyone) who wishes to enter your school will be asked a series of questions <u>before</u> they are admitted into the school building. Visitors will be asked to show a picture ID to verify identity. For an added measure of security, schools may ask to check-in their car keys with office staff for the duration of their visit if visitors are visiting the school beyond the office. This ensures all visitors exit the office and execute proper sign-out procedures through the Visitor Management System. (Consider posting a sign by the buzz-in station listing questions that will be asked, photo ID requirement and car key check-in.\*\*)

When a visitor activates the buzzer to be admitted into the school building, the secretary (usually) or anyone that is responsible for greeting visitors should greet the visitor <u>consistently</u> with a pleasant voice and say:

"Welcome to (name of school), how may I help you today?" Front office staff listens to the response and gather information for the purpose of the visit. Front office staff must listen for impairment or anger or any clues that might be helpful. If the front office staff knows the person, address them by their name and say: "Hi, Pat! How can I help you today?" Front office staff still undergoes the same protocol as if they did not know the visitor to ensure that procedures are consistent.

If the visitor wishes to meet with a staff member, pleasantly inquire: "Do you have an appointment?"

If the answer is no, ask the visitor if they would like for the secretary "to set up an appointment?"

If the visitor insists on coming into the building without giving a valid reason, tell them "someone will be with you in just a moment." Then notify the principal (or SRO if available) immediately and ask him/her to address this situation. (This needs to be carefully planned ahead of time so there is a smooth response. Be aware of agitated visitors and do not admit them to the building. This should be a district wide policy/procedure. Consistency among all schools is necessary.)

When visitors have an appointment or another valid reason to enter the building, instruct them to come directly to the office. Once they are in the office:

- Ask them to show picture identification.
- Ask them to sign in using the visitor management system.

- Collect their car keys if they are visiting the school outside of the front office (see the next paragraph).
- Issue a visitor badge rather than allow visitors to get their own badges. The badge should be worn on the outside of the garment for easy visibility.
- <u>Visitor's car keys</u>: (OPTIONAL) Schools may request that visitors check-in their car keys with the office staff before they are admitted into the building. This is done in an effort to maintain an accurate accounting of all visitors who are inside the building at any given time. (Thank them for their cooperation when they relinquish their car keys. Inform them that the keys will be returned when they return to the office, check out, and return the sticker/badge.

When visitors check out of the building, have them return the visitor badge lanyard, sign out, and then return their car keys to them. Thank them for their cooperation.

If the visitor is to pick up a student, ask them to report to the office and remind them you will be asking for proper picture identification. Be sure to have the parent/guardian to sign out their child and have the proper school staff member (not student aids or volunteer adults) initial this release by proper policy and procedures and it recorded in IC.

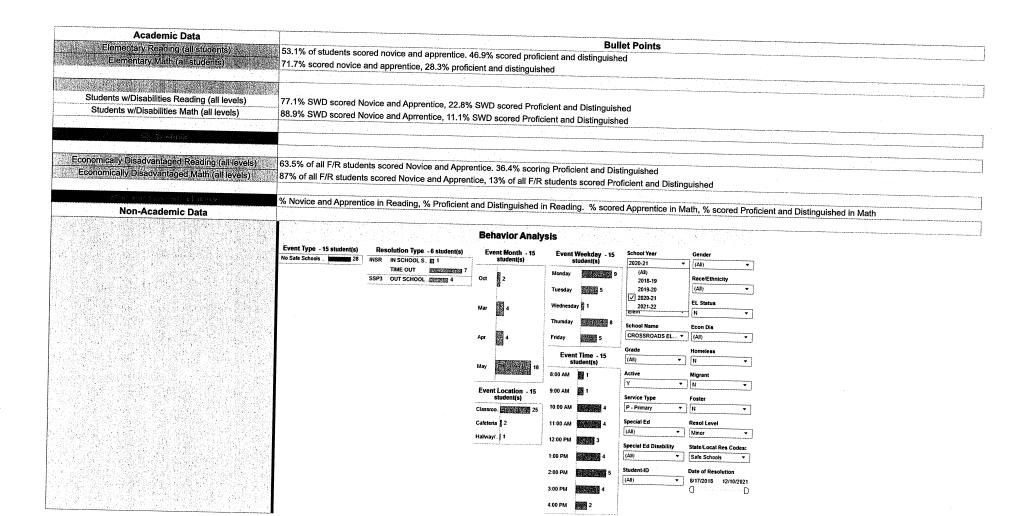

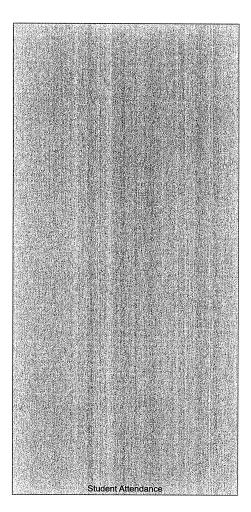

# 2021-22 Phase Three: Executive Summary for Schools

Crossroads Elementary is located in the heart of Mt. Washington, Kentucky. The school is in the midst of a residential subdivision allowing students to easily walk or ride their bikes to school. Our community consists of approximately 461 students ranging from Head Start to Fifth Grade, and 70 faculty and staff. We are a Title I school with an active Family Resource Center, as well as a 21st Century Community Learning Community. Currently, we have 57.7% of students qualify for the free and reduced lunch program. However, we are a CEP school, allowing all students to eat both breakfast and lunch for free. Our school has approximately 19.3% of our population who are identified as special education students. Crossroads continues working to build community among all stakeholders by striving to develop trust and a sense of pride for students, teachers, parents, caregivers and the community. We are working to develop high expectations for all, strengthening a supportive Parent Teacher Association and establishing programs to enhance our students' learning through a Multi Tiered System of Supports, transition activities to our feeder middle school, transition from preschool and home to Kindergarten and through strong instructional practices. We continue to support a 21st Century Grant and programming, our school is honored to maintain this funding that provides resources and staff for before and after school academic, health and wellness, as well as social intervention to our most needy students. In addition, our school works with KYCID to refine our implementation of PBIS, building a leadership mindset and creating a sustainable culture of success. Finally, we are a Leader in Me school in year 6 of implementation. Our students have developed a growth mindset and work to embed the 7 Habits into their daily lives.

Most recently, we engaged in developing our Core Values that ties a specific, desired characteristic of our students to the 7 Habits. Our values focus on ensuring that all students are taught and given the opportunity to succeed. This tenet focuses on what we do, each and every day. We focus on providing each child what they need to succeed. KYCID/PBIS is implemented throughout Crossroads in grades PreK-5th grade. All teachers spend time at the beginning of the school year and then throughout the year to teach expectations. Daily, students quote the Crossroads' I-LEAD statement: "I am a Trailblazer. I Listen, Excel, Always Care and Do what is right. I am a Trailblazer, I LEAD." Throughout all settings, staff build the core expectation of listening, excelling, caring and doing what is 'right.' Students are recognized throughout the year for accomplishments and achievements: academically, behaviorally, socially, etc. The counselor builds understanding in the core characteristics through instruction in the 7 Habits of Highly Effective Kids, as well as direct and indirect classroom instruction from teachers and staff in the 7 Habits. We also implement character education programming to supplement our social deficits due to our socioeconomic level. Each day, our students' and teachers' engage in social emotional learning through the morning meeting, as well as a school-wide morning meeting each Friday. We encourage self-worth and instilling hope in our students through various avenues including personal notes provided to students, teachers and other stakeholders. In addition, we have implemented the Leader in Me throughout our school, implementing leadership skills through the 7 Habits of Happy Kids. Our students maintain data notebooks, complete student led conferences and hold leadership roles throughout the school.

Notable Achievements and Areas of Improvement

Our school received a grant from the Leader.org to implement the Leader in Me throughout our whole school. All our staffulty received specific training from Franklin Covey on the 7 Habits of Highly Effective People and are directly teaching our students the 7 Habits. In addition, we have developed student leaders and jobs throughout the whole building to provide leadership opportunities for growth. Our school includes intense, focused instruction in STEM on engineering and the engineering process. Our school is working to include mathematics and writing instruction within this process, as well. Areas of Improvement: Attendance held steady this past year, so we are working hard to increase our attendance for the year. Our goal is 96.00% for the year. We are using the 7 Habits of Highly Effective

Kids and teaching student responsibility throughout the school year. Professional development is ongoing and an area of improvement for our teachers. We are working to pinpoint areas of growth for teachers and provide specific professional learning based on teacher reflection and need. Currently, we have several new staff members. Each new staff person is provided with a mentor in order to both provide support and fill the gap that KTIP left behind. Teachers are provided regular feedback on their instructional practice through walk-throughs and evaluation. Our instructional coach also provides support and completes instructional rounds, focusing on the strengths of teachers to increase effectiveness. Math Fluency is an area for growth. Based on our data, we need to work specifically with our special needs students to increase their fluency and comprehension for growth. Our target is to increase fluency across the school by 80% this year. Finally, we have targeted writing instruction and practice as an area we need to improve. We have align processes and assessment for writing K - 5 in on-demand, informational and narrative pieces, in addition to short answers and extended response questions. We have developed specific graphic organizers aligned K - 5, as well. We are continuing to work toward the goal of increasing each student one level based on the Kentucky Short Answer, Kentucky Extended Response and On-Demand Rubrics.

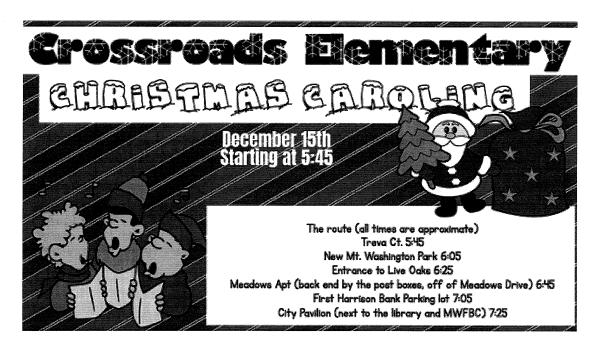
