About the EL Program


We currently have almost 200 EL students

Our EL population has nearly tripled since 2017 There are 22 languages spoken in BCPS


There are 19 countries represented in BCPS

What We Do


Teach




ACCESS Test

The ACCESS test is an English proficiency

test that assesses all four language domains (listening, speaking, reading, and writing).

- EL students take this test each year in January and receive a score for each language domain, as well as an overall score.
- Scores range from 1-6 and students must receive an overall score of 4.5 or higher to exit the EL program.
