# Prior to 2019

- ▶ School Counselor ratios were:
  - 1 to 786 (MCES)
  - 1 to 660 (MCIS)
  - 1 to 647 (KMS)
  - 2 to 797 (MCSH)
- ▶ Isolated from each other
- ▶ Reactive in Nature- “putting out fires”
- ▶ Overwhelmed with administrative/new student/testing duties
- ▶ Little, if any Tier I instruction occurring

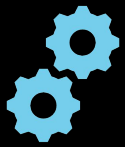

# Lower Our Ratios:

ASCA recommends 1:250 ratio; state average is 1:366

**MCES: 1:730**

**MCIS: 1:630**

**KMS: 1:682**

**MCSH: 1:330**

**M. Central: 1:68**



# Why Does this Matter?

Research shows adding 1 school counselor has a higher rate of improving achievement than adding 1 teacher

School Counselors are the only Mental Health Professionals in Mercer Schools providing tier 1, 2 and 3 services

School Counselors are the only MHP's providing tier 1 PREVENTATIVE programming/curricula





# Why Does this Matter Post COVID

Suicide rates and anxiety are higher than ever

Suicide threats at MCIS in 2019 by this time were 15. This year, 34.

Prevention is the KEY! Not just reactive services!
