




Student Demographics Analysis






Student Demographics


Race/Ethnicity Data

NPS: Total number of students served: 65. Total number of regular attendees (30+ days): 31 Glows: We have a thriving after school program. We currently provide services for roughly 45 students daily.

Needs: We are working to grow our morning program. We have identified students that are in need of extra support and will be contacting parents to tell them of this additional learning opportunity.

NIS: Total number of students served: 97 Total number of regular attendees (30+ days): 27 Glows: Our students are really enjoying Dungeons and Dragons as well as Video Game Design this semester. Some days we see as many as 70 kids after school

Needs: We are working to grow our morning program. We have a lot of students that are in need of extra support. We are also striving to retain 5th and 6th graders. Most of these students have the option to walk home.

NHS: 7th and 8th total number of students served: 35. 9th-12th total number of students served: 38 Total number of regular attendees (30+ days) 0

Glows: We now have a full time site coordinator at the high school. Torrie Watkins has been a great addition to the 21st Century staff. We have also grown the program from 6 students since October. We are gearing up to start a credit recovery class after school Monday through Thursday. We will also be offering study tables daily for student athletes that need extra support to remain eligible to play.

District wide: We are gearing up for Summer School and have met with all three buildings to work together to offer an amazing program. The staff have been polled to see who is interested and willing to work the summer programs again this year. Our summer action plays are due to KDE on March 11th. We are also waiting to hear if we received the two continuation grants that we applied for this year. If granted they will cover the intermediate school and the entire high school, meaning we will have one grant for every school in the district.

School Health Center

Pam Pedigo, Health Center Coordinator

Covid cases are declining in our school community, as well as the wider Newport community, and nationwide. That's the good news. In the health arena we have stepped back into more routine pursuits such as vaccine compliance, as well as compliance with state requirements such as school physicals, vision screenings and dental screenings.

Our dental partner, Big Smiles, returned to our facilities a couple weeks ago to finish up some dental needs for the kids.

We held 12 vaccine events in conjunction with our lab partner, Ethos. Very poor participation from both students and staff. I will say that one of the issues was with the sign-up process set up by Ethos whereby folks had some difficulty making vaccine appointments.

We have begun to make a big push to complete 6th grade school physicals and vaccines at NIS. At NPS, Rebecca is making inroads on kindergarten requirements (entrance school physical, vision screen, dental screen) that are delinquent. At NHS, Nadine too, is working on vaccine compliance with a focus on the requirement for 16 year olds #2 meningococcal vaccine.

LifeVac is a new choking rescue device we have approved to be placed in each building cafeteria. We will be reviewing the use of the device with key staff members when they come in and are installed.

We have another idea we would like to launch as well. Liz, NP does a number of the 6th grade physical evaluations that are required by KY law. We notice that a number of these kids have poor hygiene and sometimes poor dental care is noted as well. We would like to prepare a bag/container that we give to the students that Liz sees for school physicals that includes trial size deodorant, toothbrush, trial size toothpaste, maybe pads for girls, bar soap, hand sanitizer, hair brushes and combs. We have not looked into possible funding sources yet. I plan to email Big Smiles to see if they can assist with the dental items.

Student visits to nursing office in January:

- NPS: 221 visits, one daily urinary cath procedure.
- NIS: 324 visits, one diabetic management, one daily urinary cath management.
- NPS: 312 visits, one diabetic management.

The School Based Health Clinic (SBHC) is being increasingly utilized by both students and staff! That, too, is great news! We have made efforts to increase the profile of our services and we are showing some results for that effort. Liz frequently sees both students and staff for sick visits. At the same time, we are leaning in to having the entire 6th grade meet the state health requirements before they leave the NIS building.

Nurse Rebecca has the NPS building well under control and Nurse Nadine is settling in nicely at NHS.
