Grants Report

Grants in Progress:

- **GEER II Grant** - The FRYSC centers were awarded \$100,000 for GEER II funds for 2 year expenditure period beginning 7-1-21. This will be a combined FRYSC grant for each center. Budget plan is for Child Care, Youth Leaders, GROW sessions, Relatives raising Relatives program.
- **McKinney Vento Grant** – This grant was just awarded/renewed for another 3 years. Bellevue/Dayton/Southgate are partnering and Ericka Huff will continue as McKinney-Vento Coordinator. Award amount is \$107,215.00 per year.
- **Positive Action Grant** – This is a multi-district grant. This is LES only, with grades 2,4,6 are participating. This project is being coordinated by Amanda Minser.
- **Preschool Partnership Grant** – This grant is currently in progress.
- **Northern Kentucky Institute for Arts Integration** – This is a multi-district grant that I had not previously listed, but we did receive.
- **Equipment Assistance Grant** – This grant has been awarded – Lincoln Elementary School was awarded and will be purchasing a new oven

Grants in Implementation:

Grants Pending:

- **School Based Mental Health Grant** – The Northern Kentucky Institute for Mental Health Services is a proposal to the US Department of Education to increase the number of credentialed school-based mental health services providers in Northern Kentucky providing mental health services to students in Local Education Authorities with demonstrated need. This grant would provide more than a million dollars the first year and \$3,000,000 a year each year after that for a total of five years funding. As planned, it will provide up



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to \$65,000 a year in years 2-5 for up to 21 hires and up to \$15,000 for practicum and intern placements (10 in year 1, 21 in years 2-5) of mental health professionals in schools of Northern Kentucky Cooperative for Educational Services. The grant requires a 25% match, which can be in-kind or actual funds; schools would be responsible for any costs above \$65,000 to hire the staff (likely this would include fringe benefits, perhaps office items, etc.) Other funding to schools could include limited office supplies and materials needed for providing mental health services (curriculum, puppets, etc.). Supervision costs for up to six candidates for licensure for LSW or LPCC each year would be provided through the grant.



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
