2021-2022 State Accountability Results - JCPS

Overall Celebrations and Highlights:

- Graduation Rate at all-time high
- All high schools had a graduation rate above 80% for the first time ever
- Post-secondary readiness at all-time high
- Closing the achievement gap between African American and White students in graduation rate and postsecondary readiness rates
- More schools exited CSI status than ever before
- Fewer schools in the lowest ("red") rating across all indicators

Growth Areas:

- Increase focus on accelerated learning
- Continue efforts to eliminate the achievement gap in proficiency
- Implement laser-like focus on deep implementation of three pillars and six instructional systems in every school to support improvement in proficiency, graduation rate, and postsecondary readiness.

Overall Classifications:

- 11 schools exited CSI status, an increase from 9 schools exiting the last cycle.
- 11 schools entered CSI status, a decrease from 23 schools entering the last cycle.
- 31 total schools are CSI, 59 schools are TSI, and 2 schools are ATSI.
- JCPS received an overall orange (low) rating at the elementary, middle, and high school levels, the same rating as last cycle.
- Seven schools (5%) received very high ratings: Greathouse, Lowe, Norton, Barret, Brown MS, Brown HS, and Manual. That is the same number as last cycle.
- Thirteen schools (10%) received high ratings: Brandeis, Brown ES, Dunn, Farmer, Field, Norton Commons, Stopher, JCTMS, Meyzeek, Noe, Atherton, Ballard, Male. That is almost double the number from the last cycle.
- 41 schools (30%) received the lowest rating, a decrease of 5% from last cycle.
- Five schools received "high" or "very high" ratings in all areas: Norton, Stopher, Brown MS, Brown HS, Manual. 14 schools received "low or very low" ratings in all areas (8 ES, 5 MS, 1 HS), down from 56 schools the last cycle.

Graduation Rate:

- The graduation rate is an all-time high of 85.6%.
- The gap between Black and White students with graduation rate has been cut by nearly 50%. In 2017-18, there was almost a 5-percentage point gap in terms of graduation rate between Black and White students. With the class of 2022, there is only a gap of 2.6%. African American 4 year graduation rate is at 84.3%, which is an all-time high for black students in the district.

- For the most recent accountability cycle, the average (4 and 5 year) graduation rate increased from 82.9% in 2019 to 85.6% in 2022.
- 9 high schools increased their average graduation rate. All high schools were above 80% for the first time.

Postsecondary Readiness:

- The class of 2022 had the highest postsecondary readiness rate in the history of the district with a rate of 68.1% (72% with bonus). This is an increase of nearly 18% since 2018, when the transition readiness rate was below 50% of the class.
- The achievement gap between black and White students was also greatly reduced. In the class of 2018, there was a 33.7% difference between black and White students. In that year, only 30.6% of black students were considered transition ready. In the class of 2022, 53.9% of black students were post- secondary ready, and the gap dropped to an all-time low of 24.8%.
- For the most recent accountability cycle, the percentage of students transition ready increased from 53% in 2019 to 68% in 2022.
- 17 high schools showed double-digit gain in transition readiness rates since 2019 (with Central, Doss, Iroquois, and Seneca doubling or close to doubling their readiness rates).

Proficiency:

- Elementary students improved in all content areas (remained steady in writing) from 2021 non-accountability data.
- High schoolers improved or stayed the same in Reading and Math.
- Math improved at all levels (remained the same at high school).

English Learners Progress:

- 52 elementary schools, 13 middle schools, and 12 high schools had a sufficient number of students to receive a score for this indicator.
- 62% of elementary school students, 36% of middle school students, and 38% of high school students showed progress on language proficiency.

Quality of School Climate and Safety

- In general, elementary school students gave higher ratings of school climate than middle or high school students.
- Black and White students did not differ significantly in their perceptions of school climate or safety.

Gap:

- Gap is NOT an indicator in this accountability system.
- 59 schools were identified as TSI based on a student group performing as poorly as all students in any of the lowest performing 5% of schools. Schools could be identified as TSI based on more than 1 student group.
- Here are the number of schools with identified gaps in the following student groups: 43
 African American, 38 Students with Disabilities, 23 English Learners (plus monitored), 14
 Economically Disadvantaged, 5 Hispanic, 2 White, and 1 Two or More Races

- The #/% in the highest category remained the same. The # in the second highest category doubled from the last accountability cycle.

- The # in the highest category fell by 1 school and remained the same for the second highest category since the last accountability cycle.

- However, the # in the highest category fell from 12 to 7 schools.
