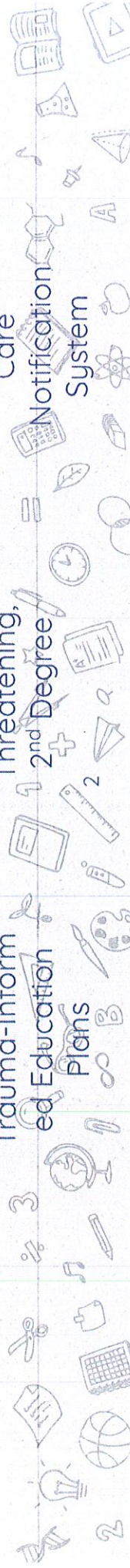

BUILDING ACCESS

- ✓ All buildings utilize card readers at main entrances for staff.
- ✓ Limited access for visitors, report directly to office.
- ✓ Video cameras with audio prior to allowing visitor access to buildings.
- ✓ Classroom doors locked during instruction.
- ✓ Locks and Keys a priority!

AUGUST

- ✓ Emergency Plans approved by SBDM and reviewed with ALL staff prior to 1st day of instruction.
- ✓ **Active Shooter Training** for all staff.
- ✓ **Threat Assessment Team Training (KCSS)**
 - ✓ Aug. 11th & Sept. 22nd
- ✓ Bus Drivers & DA's - Presentation from Homeland Security and Houchens Insurance Group

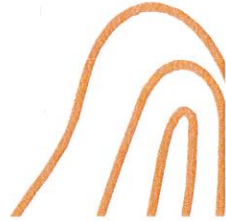


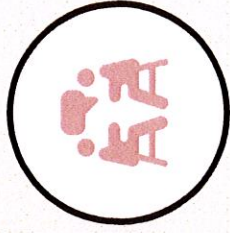


PASS Universal SEL Screener

- Communicated with families through various means



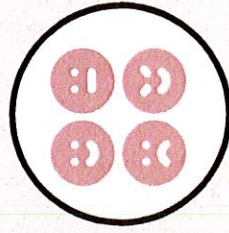


Basic Info

- Administered 3rd-12th Graders, 2x per year.

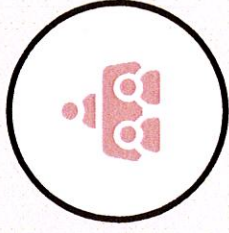
Communication

- Identify outside services needed.



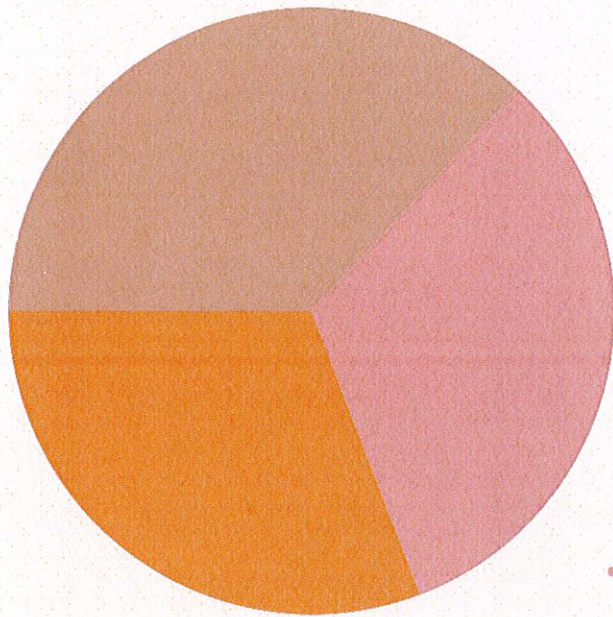
Next Steps
