## Commissioner's Report December 2022

### KY Tech District of Area Technology Centers (ATCs)

The Kentucky Department of Education's (KDE's) 50 state-operated Area Technology Centers (ATCs) are continuing to provide relevant and rigorous career and technical instruction to over 16,000 students this semester. The ATCs are working to promote career and technical student organizations (CTSOs) which offer co-curricular resources and opportunities for students in the form of leadership development through activities, community service, and competitions.



Boone County ATC student, Spencer Staley, placed 1<sup>st</sup> out of over 300 students from 27 states and 3 countries who took the Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) test at the University of Northern Ohio on November 5. Spencer earned a \$20,000 scholarship to Northern Ohio where he plans to attend starting this coming June. He plans to specialize in High-Performance Automotive and Medium/Heavy-Duty Diesel. His career goals include becoming a service driver for Indy Sports Racing or Formula One Racing. 

#### Kentucky School for the Blind

KSB's school counselor focused on Gratitude in school during the month of November as part of the school's Mental Health Matters series. "Focusing on what is good in your life and doing things for others is a very effective way to increase our happiness and positive emotions" (from KSB newsletter). The KSB Boys Varsity Goalball team was undefeated at the North Central Association of Schools for the Blind Conference (NCASBC) Championships on November 5, 2022 and brought home a first place win for the first time since 2008! Goalball is a team sport played exclusively by the visually impaired. The game is played with two teams of three players who try to roll a ball which contains bells past the opposing team into a net to score points.



The new accessible playground, "Anthony's Wish," was dedicated on November 11<sup>th</sup>. Several years in the planning, the playground was a collaborative effort with the Make-A-Wish Foundation, other fiscal sponsors and KSB student Anthony.





On November 17<sup>th</sup> the Music Department hosted a Fall Music Concert showcasing the musical talents of the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade students. Students showcased their talents on a variety of musical

instruments (drums, guitar, keyboard, etc.) with the help of their music teachers Mr. Honey and Mr. White.



#### Kentucky School for the Deaf

KSD hosted the Accreditation Team from the Conference of Educational Administrators of Schools and Programs for the Deaf (CEASD) November 13-15, 2022. The team toured campus, met with staff, students and community members, observed classes and reviewed documentation in considering accreditation status for the school. The CEASD accreditation process encompassed a two-year process of self-analysis and self-reflection in a means to drive continuous improvement in the education of students who are deaf and hard of hearing.

As KSD celebrates 200 years this school year, many events are scheduled as part of the celebration. The Jacobs Hall Christmas Tours take place on December 9-10, 2022.
