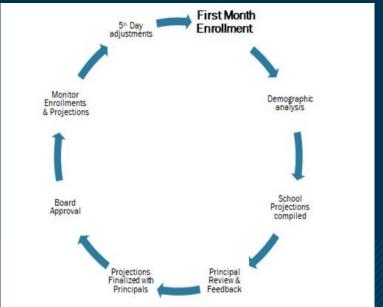

## **2023-24 Enrollment Projections**

- Develop student enrollment projections for initial budget allocations
- Compile annual room usage surveys, floor plans, KDE reports, and Infinite Campus schedules in order to determine
  optimal building capacities
- Analyze daily projected enrollments to identify past patterns and predict future trends in order to ensure funds are allocated properly to schools (especially with implementation of new Student Assignment Plan)
- Optimal Capacity
  - 100% is ideal target based on design of the building, but does not mean a school is completely full
  - A range of 75-115% of optimal allows for schools to decide how to use their flexible space

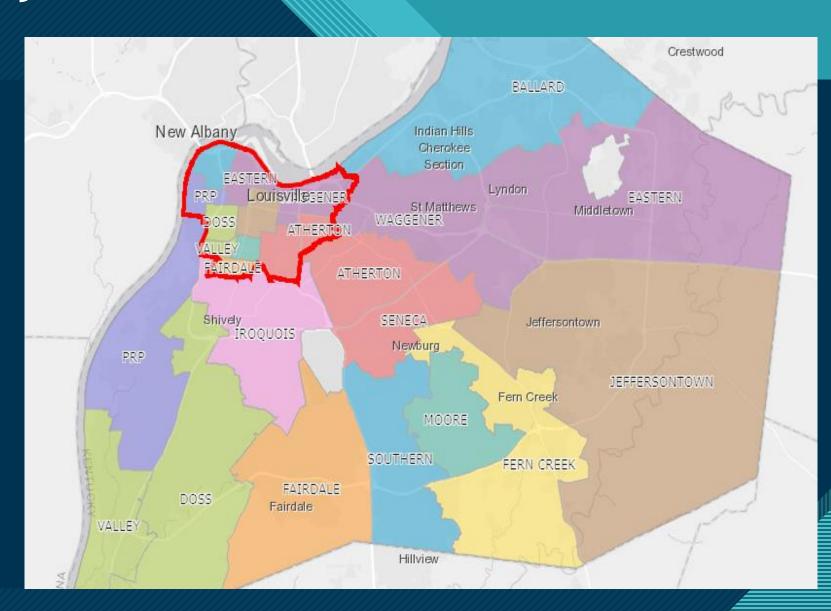






## 2023-24 Enrollment Projections

  - Louisville-Jefferson CountyInformation Consortium (LOJIC)

# Student-Weighted Staffing Formula

Goal: Greater resource equity among schools

### Middle & High Staffing Formula

### Based on JCPS Student Needs Index

- JCPS Needs Index = 0.5 (%FRL) + 0.3 (%Mobility) + 0.15 (%ECE) + 0.05 (%ELL)
- % Free Reduced Lunch 0.5
- % Mobility 0.3
- % Exceptional Child Education 0.15
- % English Language Learner 0.05

### School Categories – Tier I, II, III, and IV

- Tier I standard allocation for schools with lowest relative student needs according to the JCPS Needs Index
- Tier II moderate-need schools
- **Tier III -** high-need schools
- Tier IV maximum-need schools relative to other JCPS schools

### Increased School Need Allocations

- High need Tiers receive additional supports
- Increase of school allocations \$10.5 million plus a one year reserve

# Operational Support beyond the \$147 per pupil allocation

(SEEK per pupil \$4,200 times 3.5% = \$147)

### Middle, and High Schools

- \$10,000 for Furniture
- \$10,000 for Technology-Related Hardware
- \$10,000 for Technology-Related Supplies
- \$35 per pupil Textbook Allocation in flexible funding



### Elementary Schools will continue to be supported with the following:

- \$3,500 + \$5.50 per pupil for Furniture in flexible funding
- \$7 per pupil for Office Supplies in flexible funding
- \$35 per pupil for Textbook Allocation in flexible funding



# Elementary Student-Weighted Staffing Formula

### **Elementary School Non-Flexible Allocation Supports**

- 1.0 Assistant Principal for All Elementary Schools
- 1.0 Academic Instructional Coach for All Elementary Schools
- 1.0 ECE Implementation Coach for All Elementary Schools
- 1.0 Mental Health Practitioner for All Elementary Schools

# **Standard Equity Allocation**

Elementary Schools will receive flexible Equity Funds calculated as follows:

- \$1,000 times the JCPS Needs Index
- \$1,000 times the percentage of Students of Color

For example, an elementary school with a JCPS Needs Index of 50 and 80% SOC will receive \$1,000 \* 50 + \$1,000 \* 80 = \$130,000 in flexible use equity funds which is the equivalent to about 2.0 teachers.



# Elementary Student-Weighted Staffing Formula

Enhanced Allocations for AIS, Choice Zone and "AIS Prevention"

### Flexible Equity Funds:

- \$1,500 times the JCPS Needs Index
- \$1,500 times the percentage of Students of Color

For example, an elementary school with a JCPS Needs Index of 50 and 80% SOC will receive:

\$1,500 \* 50 + \$1,500 \* 80 = \$195,000 in flexible use equity funds which is the equivalent to about 3.0 teachers

AIS, Choice Zone and "AIS Prevention" Elementary Schools will receive the following flexible supports:

- 1.0 Resource Teacher
- 1.0 In-School Security Monitor



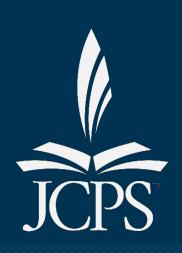


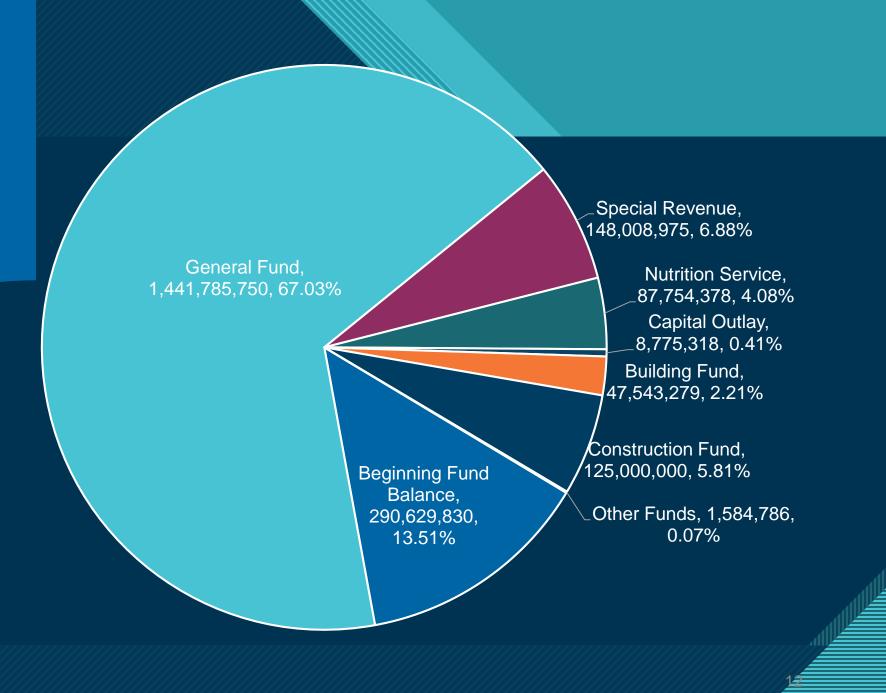

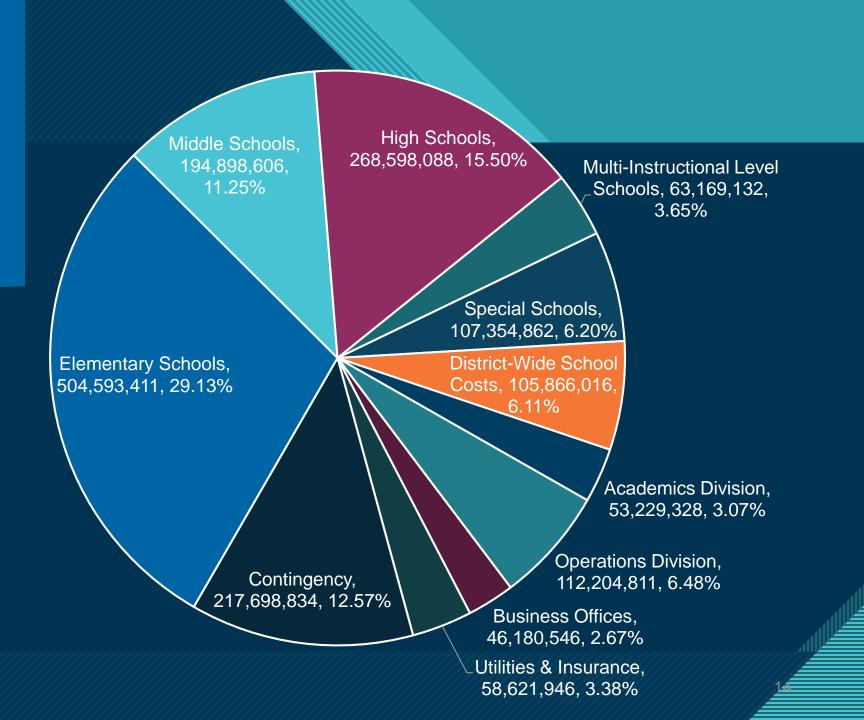
