UNION, Ky. — Matthew Mangine Jr. felt back where he belonged — on the soccer field.

His cleats dug into the grass as he ran with his teammates at the end of their first preseason conditioning.

It was June 16, 2020, the day after Kentucky lifted its COVID-19 sports shutdown.

The 16-year-old was running his final sprint when he dropped to his knees.

His coach called 911.

His mom, Kim, was in the parking lot talking with another parent. When she saw the commotion surrounding her oldest son, she began running.

Another parent was sent to find the athletic trainer, who was at the girls' soccer practice at the other end of the school, on the far west side of campus.

No one phoned the athletic trainer to tell him there was an emergency.

No one ran for a defibrillator.

Cosgrove hired by Carroll Co. sheriff's office

Fired Louisville officer involved in Taylor shooting

The Louisville police officer who delivered the bullet that killed Breonna Taylor in March 2020 is back working in law enforcement.

Myles Cosgrove, who was fired by the Louisville Metro Police Department in January 2021, has been hired by the Carroll County Sheriff's Office, Chief Deputy Rob Miller told The Courier Journal on Saturday.

The county is about an hour north-east of downtown Louisville and has a population of around 10,000.

Cosgrove was one of three officers who fired their weapons during a raid of Taylor's apartment March 13, 2020. Taylor and her boyfriend, Kenneth Walker,

Unwinding Medicaid sows concern

Tonya Moore, 49, relies on doctor visits and prescription drugs to manage her diabetes, chronic pain and high blood pressure.

But her access to routine care is now in danger. She is among tens of thousands of Arkansas residents poised to lose coverage under the state's Medicaid health insurance program for low-income and disabled residents.

The federal government provided billions in federal aid to states on the condition that they wouldn't remove people from Medicaid until the COVID-19 public
