Senate Bill 1

- Superintendent designate School Safety Coordinator
- Designate a school safety and security threat assessment team at each school consisting of 2 or more staff members
- Identify and respond to students exhibiting behavior that indicates a potential threat to school safety or security
- Members may include school admins, <u>counselors</u>, SROs, school based mental health services providers, teachers and other school personnel (<u>School Social</u> <u>workers</u>, Nurses, etc.)

Threat Assessment Board Policy 09.429

The purpose of a team shall be to identify and respond to students exhibiting behavior that indicates a potential threat to school safety or school security.

FBI Recommendations on School Violence

"Although the risk of......at any one school is very low, threats of violence are potentially a problem at any school. Once a threat is made, having a <u>fair</u>, rational, and standardized method of <u>evaluating and responding to threats</u> is critically important."

(FBI report p 1)

What is a threat?

- A threat is an expression of intent to harm someone.
- Threats may be spoken, written, or gestured.
- Threats may be direct or indirect, and need not be communicated to the intended victim or victims.
- Weapon possession is presumed to be a threat unless circumstances clearly indicate otherwise.
- When in doubt assume it is a threat.

Virginia Threat Assessment Model

- Developed 2001 at University of Virginia
- School-based teams gather information
- Follow decisions-tree to determine whether threat is transient or substantive
- Take protective action if substantive
- Attempt to resolve the problem underlying the threat

Substantive threats: Factors to Consider

- Age/Maturity of student
- Capability of student to carry out the threat
- Student's discipline history
- Credibility of student and willingness to acknowledge his or her behavior
- Credibility of witness accounts
- When in doubt, treat threats as substantive.
