**Response:**

GES has utilized a variety of processes for reviewing allocation and use of resources (people, time, and money), and for any resource inequities that were used for identifying our under performance. In reflection, the school did not have curriculum documents and pacing guides that were systematic and utilized by all staff. This prohibited students from receiving effective and appropriate Tier 1 instruction to the level of standards. This also created a barrier for progress monitoring. Other processes and systems such as PLC’s, walkthrough formats, and MTSS plans were not formalized. The school also did not have a formal math resource it was utilizing and had recently begun implementation of a new literacy program. High turnover also led to inconsistent professional learning opportunities for staff and proper training in the school’s approved programs. Additionally, there was not consistent science and social studies instruction during the pandemic.

Improvement efforts were also determined through our school’s needs assessment processes and protocols along with the school audit review data/feedback. In addition, the school’s turnaround team has contributed critical feedback and input regarding improvement initiatives based on audit review information and our improvement priorities.
