16 high school student leaders selected for inaugural National Student Advisory Council

Sixteen high school student leaders from across the nation have been selected to serve on the inaugural NFHS National Student Advisory Council (NSAC), which will meet for the first time Jan. 20-23 in Indianapolis.

The 16 student leaders, all juniors in classification and all involved in sports or performing arts activities in their schools, will be attending a number of meetings throughout the 2024 calendar year to provide the NFHS student perspectives on participation in high school sports and performing arts.

The NFHS is the national leader and advocate for high school sports and performing arts and works with its 51-member state associations and 19,800 high schools to provide participation opportunities to the more than 12 million students involved in education-based activity programs.

"This is an historic and exciting venture for the NFHS," said Dr. Karissa Niehoff, CEO of the NFHS. "We have had thousands of meetings for many decades with committees composed of adult representation, but never an advisory group composed solely of students. Since students involved in these activities are ultimately the ones we serve, we are looking forward to gaining their insight and perspectives on ways to make these programs better and more effective. "Thanks to advocacy from the NFHS Student Services Committee and National Student Leadership Summit Planning Committee, as well as support from the NFHS Board of Directors and staff, we are pleased to be launching the National Student Advisory Council next month."

Two students from each of the eight NFHS geographical regions were chosen for the NSAC, all of whom have exhibited outstanding leadership skills, achievements in academics and sports/activities, and a commitment to making a positive impact in their communities. All students have previously been a part of the NFHS National Student Leadership Summit, which is held every summer in Indianapolis.
