

Marion County High School once again hosted the annual Manufacturing Day where local industries were able to meet with students about career opportunities.








Kentucky Cooperage made donations to schools based on supplies they requested.


MCPS saw academic improvements across the district.

Marion County Knight Academy (60.0 vs. 43.9)



Academics



- 15 teachers and 3 administrators completed LETRS training, with 13 of these teachers receiving a rank change
- New Teacher Academy focused on standards-driven instruction.
- Over 1,000 district classroom walk-throughs completed
- Used ESSER funds to adopt new textbooks and resources for content and grade areas that needed most support based on data.
- Gave teachers opportunity to make large item funding requests to make use of ESSER funding -- over \$70,000 of requests approved.



Human Resources



- MCPS continued its relationship with Campbellsville University inviting students to observe classes and sharing information about employment opportunities
- 97.5% of positions are currently filled across the district
- Increased the number of available substitute teachers and substitute instructional assistants, which decreased need for teachers to cover classes.
- 3.5% raise across the board on district salary schedule

Transportation

- Added first air-conditioned bus
- New digital radios

Technology

- Installed 170 ViewSonic Panels
- Replaced two computer labs (MCMS & MCKA)
- Implemented new reporting system for technology issues

EL/Migrant

- 24 students graduated with 11 students receiving a score of 4.5 or above on the ACCESS state assessment

School Nutrition

- Received \$50,000 Farm-to-School grant from Kentucky Department of Agriculture
- Organized first Central KY School Nutrition mini-conference

Preschool

- Served 104 three- & four-year olds across six preschool classrooms
- All preschool teachers have completed LETRS training for early childhood
