

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT Between Jefferson County Board of Education And REACH EVALUATION

This Memorandum of Agreement (hereinafter "Agreement") is entered into between the Jefferson County Board of Education (hereinafter "JCPS"), a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, with its principal place of business at 3332 Newburg Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40218 and REACH EVALUATION, LLC. (hereinafter "REACH Evaluation"), an organization located at 501 Park Ave. Louisville, KY 40208, under contract with the Kentucky Department for Behavioral Health, Development and Intellectual Disabilities (DBHDID) for the administration of the Kentucky Incentives for Prevention (KIP) survey.

WHEREAS this agreement serves as a commitment for JCPS to participate in the 2024 Kentucky Incentives for Prevention (KIP) Youth Survey. This agreement also outlines conditions to be met by the evaluation contractor, REACH Evaluation, and JCPS as it relates to the administration of the KIP 2024 Youth Survey.

THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, premises, and mutual agreements set forth herein, JCPS and REACH Evaluation agree as follows:

1. Duties of JCPS:

- a. JCPS agrees to the following terms regarding the administration of the KIP Survey:
 - i. Provide one district-level contact person to coordinate the 2024 KIP Youth Survey, and provide this person's name, telephone number, and e-mail address to the KIP survey evaluation contractor (REACH Evaluation).
 - ii. Identify a liaison for each participating school.
 - iii. Provide all necessary staff for planning and administering the survey.
 - iv. Utilize an <u>active consent</u> model involving both general and specific notification to parents that requires explicit parental permission for student participation in the survey. Parents will be informed about the content and rationale of the survey and that they have the right to inspect the survey. Parents will have the opportunity to provide permission that allows their student to participate.
 - v. Distribute active consent notices, including a KIP Youth Survey Fact Sheet, a notification letter from the district that the school is offering the survey, and a permission form to parents at least **two weeks prior** to administration of the survey.
 - vi. Provide the opportunity for all students <u>learning in-person only</u> in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12, with signed parental permission forms, to participate in the 2024 KIP Youth Survey.
 - vii. Ensure that students are informed that they are not required to participate and that no coercion or consequence will occur if they decline to participate.
 - viii. Maintain a list, by classroom, of submitted permission forms, and review this list with survey administrators on the survey date to ensure that students not

- participating are given something else to do during the time the survey is being administered.
- It will ensure that all teachers and staff members involved in administering the survey adhere to all confidentiality standards and administration protocols.
- i. Obtain a signed confidentiality agreement from each person involved in administration of the survey, including staff at the classroom level up to the district coordinator.
- ii. Complete a Classroom Report Form for each participating classroom.
- iii. Complete online administration of the survey no later than November 15, 2024.
- iv. Administration Cost: JCPS will not use US Department of Education funds (e.g., Safe and DrugFreeSchools) to pay for any costs associated with the KIP survey. There is no cost to the school district for materials, scoring, analysis, interpretation, report writing, or report production. These costs are paid by the Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities, Division of Substance Use Disorder (DSUD).
- b. JCPS agrees to provide REACH Evaluation with the data elements requested and according to the schedule designated in Attachment A to support implementation and aggregate reporting of the KIP survey by REACH Evaluation.
 - i. It is understood that opt-in consent will be required for students to participate in the KIP survey.
 - ii. JCPS represents and warrants that, except as specified and authorized by REACH Evaluation in writing, such data shall not be disclosed, released, revealed, shown, sold, rented, leased, loaned, or otherwise have access granted to the data covered by this Agreement to any person, except as required by law or court order. Access to the data covered by this Agreement shall be limited to the minimum number of individuals necessary to achieve the purpose stated in this Agreement and to those individuals on a need-to-know basis only.
 - iii. It is acknowledged that students will take the survey on a secure platform entitled Alchemer. The students will not be identified and will remain anonymous during the survey. Each school will have a login code so that data may be analyzed at the school level.
 - iv. It is acknowledged that REACH Evaluation will provide a school district report that reports percentage response patterns by grade.
 - v. Both parties acknowledge that REACH Evaluation will be the owners of the data. Any requests that come into JCPS for release of data will follow the protocols listed below.
 - vi. REACH Evaluation will provide JCPS a limited electronic data set containing raw data and a directory from the 2024 administration of the KIP survey within the JCPS school district. Only data pertaining to students in the district will be released for this purpose.
 - vii. It is understood that these data do not comprise Protected Health Information within the meaning of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and therefore are not subject to the "HIPAA Rules".
 - viii. JCPS represents and warrants that, except as specified and authorized by REACH Evaluation in writing, such data shall not be disclosed, released, revealed, shown, sold, rented, leased, loaned, or otherwise

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have access granted to the data covered by this Agreement to any person except as required by law or court order. Access to the data covered by this Agreement shall be limited to the minimum number of individuals necessary to achieve the purpose stated in this Agreement and to those individuals on a need-to-know basis only. JCPS shall maintain the security and confidentiality of the limited data set as required by applicable laws and regulations, such as the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act.

- ix. JCPS further covenants and agrees to the following:
 - 1 JCPS will use these data for internal statistical and research purposes only. This includes analysis of data for grant application purposes.
 - 2. JCPS will not attempt to link these data files with individually identifiable data from other sources. .
 - 3. If any publication of information or report based on this limited data set, the following language should be included, "This report is based on an internal analysis of the Jefferson County school district KIP Survey raw data. The KIP Survey is administered bi-annually by the Kentucky Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities, using no federal Department of Education funds."
 - 4. JCPS shall use or disclose the limited data set only as permitted by this Agreement or as required by law.
 - 5. JCPS shall use appropriate internal safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of the limited data set for anything other than district- and building-wide planning.
 - 6. JCPS shall provide a written report to REACH Evaluation and DBHDID of any use or disclosure of the limited data set not authorized in this Agreement, including the remedial action taken by JCPS within three (3) business days of the unauthorized use or disclosure.
 - 7. JCPS may not disclose the limited data set to anyone other than those authorized by the JCPS Superintendent without the express written permission of DBHDID except as required by law, or court order.
 - 8. JCPS agrees not to use the information in the limited data set to identify or contact the individuals who are data subjects.
 - 9. JCPS will not share raw data from the KIP survey with external researchers without receiving confirmation from the Prevention Branch of the DBHDID that the intended use is consistent with the intent and policies of the DBHDID.

2. Duties of REACH Evaluation:

- a. The KIP survey evaluation contractor (REACH Evaluation) designated by DSUD will support the district in the following ways:
 - i. Provide each district with a KIP training manual and technical assistance.
 - ii. Provide all forms and documents associated with administration of the survey.
 - iii. Analyze survey data and interpret the results.

- . Provide a web page offering technical assistance, such as downloadable KIP forms and materials.
- i. Produce a school district report for each superintendent that reports percentage response patterns by grade.
- ii. Produce additional reports on individual schools, or groups of schools, when the district makes arrangements for special handling of the groups of surveys, at a small cost.
- iii. Assurance of Confidentiality: The KIP survey evaluation contractor (REACH Evaluation) designated by DSUD will not publish district or school level reports. However, under the Freedom of Information Act, any outside agency can request district reports. In such instances, DSUD and the evaluation contractor will recommend to requesting parties that they contact school district representatives directly and will inform the district representative in a timely manner of any such request.
- b. Acknowledges that projects involving program evaluation, monitoring activities, or data collection or research of any kind, are subject to JCPS IRB review and approval as determined by the JCPS IRB to meet federal, State, and Board policies. In these cases, JCPS student or staff participation is voluntary. As a federally authorized Institutional Review Board (IRB), JCPS complies with the federal definition for research, which includes sharing of Personally Identifiable Information (PII) for the purpose of answering a question or evaluating activities for effectiveness beyond standard educational or operational procedures. Thus, all research, program evaluation and data collection activities must be approved by the JCPS IRB and shall not begin before approval is secured from the JCPS IRB.
- c. If the performance of this Agreement involves the transfer by JCPS to REACH Evaluation of any data regarding any student that is subject to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 U.S.C. 1232g as amended, ("FERPA"), REACH Evaluation and JCPS must manage the data transfer in accordance with FERPA requirements, and REACH Evaluation agrees to the following conditions:
 - i. If REACH Evaluation requests transfer of identifiable data by JCPS that is subject to JCPS IRB procedures, as determined by the JCPS IRB to meet federal, State, and Board policies, JCPS cannot transfer identifiable data to REACH Evaluation before the JCPS IRB-approved informed consent process has been executed. In this case, REACH Evaluation does not function as an exception under FERPA. REACH Evaluation is responsible for obtaining, and maintaining, signed consent after JCPS IRB approval. No data will be provided under this agreement without signed consent from the guardian for records requests involving students or from the JCPS employee or community member for records requests involving adults. REACH Evaluation must deliver copies of the signed authorization to JCPS upon request.
 - ii. If REACH Evaluation has been legally deemed a FERPA exception by JCPS in accordance with FERPA Exception Conditions, then REACH Evaluation shall:

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- (a) In all respects, comply with the provisions of FERPA, including any requirements of Chapter 99 of Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations and any other applicable state or federal law.
- (b) Use any such data for no purpose other than to fulfill the purposes of this Agreement, and not share any such data with any person or entity other than REACH Evaluation and its employees, contractors, volunteers, and agents, without prior approval of JCPS. Disclosure shall be limited to only those employees, contractors, volunteers, or agents who are necessary for the fulfillment of this Agreement.
- (c) Require all employees, contractors, volunteers, and agents of REACH Evaluation to comply with all applicable provisions of FERPA with respect to any such data. REACH Evaluation shall require and maintain confidentiality Agreements with each employee, contractor, volunteer, or agent with access to data pursuant to this Agreement.
- (d) Maintain any such data in a secure environment, whether physical or electronic, and not copy, reproduce, or transmit any such data except as necessary to fulfill the purposes of this Agreement. REACH Evaluation shall notify JCPS within 24 hours in the event of any data breach or disclosure of data to any person or entity other than the parties listed in this agreement.
- (e) Collect, store, and maintain data in a manner that does not permit the identification of an individual student by anyone other than employees, contractors, or agents of REACH Evaluation necessary for the fulfillment of this Agreement and having a legitimate interest related to the purposes of this Agreement in knowing such personal identification, and not disclose any such data in a manner that would permit the identification of an individual student in any form, including, but not limited to, published results of studies.
- d. Limit data requested from JCPS to the specific elements listed in Attachment A. If the data request is associated with an approved JCPS IRB application, then the data in Attachment A should match the JCPS IRB final approval letter data elements listed.
- e. Adhere to the reporting timeframes (e.g., quarters, semesters, years) service provider requested in Attachment A.
- f. Adhere to the timelines in Attachment A for when a service provider will provide JCPS with REACH Evaluation [lists of students, signed consent forms, etc]. Notify JCPS of unexpected changes in timelines as soon as possible and accept that changes may alter JCPS' capacity to provide requested data.

- g. If relevant, obtain signed non-disclosures for each individual from REACH Evaluation responsible for evaluation and analysis activities who must access identifiable data referenced in Attachment A.
- h. Use reports produced for this project only for the purposes described above. The data and reporting shall not be used for personal or institutional gain or profit.
- To direct all communication and decisions regarding the evaluation, data collection, and analysis to the Accountability, Research, and Systems Improvement office.
- j• Acknowledges that JCPS retains the right to audit REACH Evaluation's compliance with this agreement.
- k. REACH Evaluation acknowledges that any violation of this Agreement and/or the provisions of FERPA or accompanying regulations related to the nondisclosure of protected student information constitutes just cause for JCPS to immediately terminate this Agreement pursuant to Article V of this Agreement.
- 1. Not use the name or logo of JCPS or individual JCPS schools in printed materials, websites, videos or social media without prior approval from JCPS.
- m. Maintain an all-risk property and casualty insurance policy with respect to the facilities and a policy of commercial general liability in amounts no less than \$1,000,000/\$2,000,000 per policy and provide JCPS with a certificate of insurance upon request.
- n. Require all REACH Evaluation employees/volunteers/contractors performing services under this Agreement to have on file a Criminal Records Check, per Kentucky law and JCPS requirements, completed no more than five years ago. Employees/contractors convicted of any of the following, per JCPS Board Policy 03.6, shall not be considered:
 - i. Any conviction for sex-related offenses.
 - ii. Any conviction for offenses against minors.
 - iii. Any conviction for felony offenses, except as provided below.
 - iv. Any conviction for deadly weapon-related offenses.
 - v. Any conviction for drug-related offenses, including felony drug offenses, within the past seven years.
 - vi. Any conviction for violent, abusive, threatening or harassment related offenses.
 - vii. Other convictions determined by the Superintendent/designee to bear a reasonable relationship to the ability to perform services under this Agreement.

- o. REACH Evaluation shall require all staff and volunteers performing services on JCPS school premises during JCPS school hours under this Agreement to submit per KRS 160.380 to a national and state criminal history background check by the Department of Kentucky State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation and have a letter, provided by the individual, from The Cabinet for Health and Family Services stating no findings of substantiated child abuse and neglect records maintained by the Cabinet for Health and Family Services.
- P. REACH Evaluation staff and volunteers will comply with all JCPS health safety guidelines including rules related to COVID-19 mitigation.
- q. To the extent that JCPS facilities are closed to students, those facilities will also be unavailable to REACH Evaluation. During any periods of the Non-Traditional Instruction (NTI) or remote learning, JCPS facilities will not be available to REACH Evaluation.

3. Mutual Duties:

- a. Each party shall not discriminate based on race, color, national origin, age, religion, marital or parental status, political affiliations or beliefs, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, veteran status, genetic information, disability, or limitations related to pregnancy, childbirth, or related medical conditions.
- b. Each party shall comply with all federal and state laws and regulations and all JCPS policies applicable to the provision of the services described in this Agreement, including without limitation the Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the Kentucky Educational Rights and Privacy Act (KFERPA), the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) and JCPS policies and procedures for volunteers and visitors entering JCPS facilities.
- c. The respective administrative offices of JCPS and REACH Evaluation who have responsibility for the implementation of this Agreement shall meet periodically during the term of this Agreement to evaluate the program and discuss issues of mutual concern.
- **4.** <u>Term:</u> This Agreement shall be effective commencing September 26th, 2023 and shall terminate on September 26th, 2024 The Agreement may be extended by mutual written agreement of JCPS and REACH Evaluation.
- 5. <u>Termination</u>: Either party may terminate this Agreement prior to the end of its term by giving sixty (60) days prior written notice to the other party. If JCPS terminates the Agreement, REACH Evaluation will be permitted in their discretion to continue to provide services during the period in which the sixty (60) day notice becomes effective. JCPS may terminate this agreement immediately in the event of a student health or safety concern or a bREACH Evaluation of paragraph 2.j above. In the event of an immediate termination, REACH Evaluation shall not be permitted to continue to provide services after receipt of the notice of termination.

- Amendment: This Agreement may be modified or amended only by a written agreement signed by JCPS and REACH Evaluation.
- 7. Independent Parties: JCPS and REACH Evaluation are independent parties, and neither shall be construed to be an agent or representative of the other, and therefore neither shall be liable for the acts or omissions of the other. Each party shall, however, be liable for any negligent or wrongful acts of its own employees, students and invitees.
- 8. <u>Captions</u>: Section titles or captions in this Agreement are inserted as a matter of convenience and reference, and in no way define, limit, extend, or describe the scope of this Agreement.
- Entire Agreement: This Agreement contains the entire agreement between JCPS and REACH Evaluation concerning the REACH Evaluation and supersedes all prior agreements, either written or oral, regarding the same subject matter.
- 10. Severability: If a court of competent jurisdiction holds any provision of this Agreement unenforceable, such provision shall be modified to the extent required to make it enforceable, consistent with the spirit and intent of this Agreement. If such a provision cannot be so modified, the provision shall be deemed separable from the remaining provisions of this Agreement and shall not affect any other provision.
- 11. <u>Counterparts</u>: This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, in which case each executed counterpart shall be deemed an original, and all executed counterparts shall constitute one and the same instrument.
- 12. <u>Applicable Law</u>: This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

THIS AGREEMENT SUPPLEMENTS the 2024 KIP Student Survey Memorandum of Understanding signed by the JCPS Superintendent for the purpose of participation in the 2024 KIP Survey which remains in force and has been included as Attachment B.
