

### Engaging Minds with Evidence-Based Curriculum

Oldham County Schools is dedicated to promoting a strong reading culture among our K-5 students through an evidence-based curriculum to ensure their success. Our comprehensive literacy approach includes phonics, comprehension, and vocabulary strategies, ensuring students become proficient readers and laying a solid foundation for their academic future. Collaboration among educators, administrators, and families creates supportive environments where reading flourishes, empowering every student to reach their full potential and excel academically.



During the 23/24 school year, La Grange Elementary highlighted the importance of literacy by giving away over 1500 books from their PTA-sponsored Book Vending Machine (Book Box). Students earned tokens by demonstrating monthly character traits, following library expectations, and cashing in classroom rewards.



Crestwood students learned from a virtual visit with an author, read together and then took the books home to share with their families. They were so excited to share that they were pulling them out of their backpacks in the car rider line!

This year, 1665 OCS students took a total of **3897** AP exams. While scores for this year's tests aren't in yet, last year, 70% of exams taken by OCS students received a passing score, which outperforms the state and global average! Additionally, OCS students have amassed a significant number of dual-credit hours throughout their high school years. Together, they have accumulated 9,063 college credit hours, allowing them to begin their college careers with credits already earned.

Our commitment to preparing high schoolers for their future endeavors extends beyond the classroom, ensuring they are equipped to pursue their passions with confidence and competence. With a comprehensive curriculum that enables students to graduate with substantial college credit, they have a solid foundation for higher education, providing them with flexibility and opportunities for academic exploration. Additionally, through our pre-employment transition program, students engage in a multifaceted learning experience that encompasses job exploration

counseling, work-based learning, workplace readiness training, post-secondary counseling, and instruction in self-advocacy. From career counseling and job search assistance to internships and onthe-job training, students gain valuable insights into various career pathways and develop essential skills for success in the workforce. We empower our students to pursue their passion, whether they choose to further their education or enter the professional realm, with the tools and confidence needed to thrive in any endeavor.

## Elevating the EMPLOYEE EXPERIENCE

OCS has been focused on retention and recruitment of highly-qualified employees. In addition to 2% salary increase in 2023 and 3% increase in 2022, our Board approved a 7% increase for salaried certified/classified employees and \$2/hour raise for all hourly classified employees beginning July 1, 2024.

We appreciate our legislators for prioritizing our needs to increase the base SEEK funding, increasing funding for transportation. Ultimately, they passed a budget that increases support to public education, which helps us recruit and retain high quality staff for the ultimate benefit of our students. And of course, we thank our Board for recognizing the need to increase compensation as much as possible for every employee.

In addition to salary increases, OCS implemented measures to enhance employee satisfaction and enhance their overall experience within our school district. These measures include:

- Six weeks paid leave for mothers recovering from birth
- Extended leave beyond FMLA
- Free tuition for any full-time staff member's child
- Convert unused personal days into sick days
- \$35/hour for all extra-duty certified work
- Paying the La Grange city tax for all employees
- Flexibility to complete planning on your own time

- Staff seeking advancement no longer will take a pay cut
- Reduced the amount of time it takes for classified staff to earn vacation days
- Provided 2 flexible days when planning professional development
- Increased substitute teacher pay
- Expanded SRO support
- Tyto Clinics on-site virtual urgent care that connects employees and their families with medical professionals to obtain a diagnosis and even a prescription immediately

As part of our strategic plan, Oldham County Schools continues to investigate ways to elevate the experience for our employees, as a well-supported team creates an environment that positively influences student success.

## Slevating The Student Experience through Transformative FACILITIES UPGRADES





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Big changes are underway at OCHS and Buckner Alternative High School. The Board of Education has reviewed design plans for a major project which includes brand new facilities for the alternative school, Little Colonel's Daycare, and multi-purpose spaces.

#### OCHS Gym Plaza

In keeping with the Board's commitment to improve facilities for all students, the project will include a new arena-style spectator gym, multi-sport training room, and indoor sports team rooms. The major demolition and new construction project will also provide the opportunity to improve site access, increase parking facilities, and improve pedestrian/vehicular circulation.

#### SOHS

The Board of Education has reviewed the masterplan for the South Oldham High School Phase 3 Renovation and Addition Project. The masterplan includes a major classroom wing expansion, new Career Tech Education spaces, new auditorium, and ECS and fine arts suites. Major renovations of the existing "core" of the building include new kitchen, cafeteria, media center and gymnasium renovations. The masterplan will also include the next round of athletic improvements including, further site improvements to stadium perimeter, a multi-sport training facility and terraced practice fields.

These are just a few of many projects in various design and implementation stages throughout the district. Soon you will also see changes to the Oldham County Schools Arts Center and La Grange Elementary. As always, monies spent for these projects are restricted funds, and cannot be used for salaries, benefits, or instructional resources. The District Facility Plan is a comprehensive review and evaluation of the district's facilities and is prepared every four years. This plan guides the district in setting priorities for facility improvements, additions, renovation or new facilities.
