A.) Narrative:

Franklin -Simpson High School's Mission- to empower students to be college and/or career Ready.

Simpson County Board of Education's Mission- To develop all children to their fullest potential and prepare them for the next level of life.

Franklin Simpson High School Tomorrow's Leaders group is providing students with a valuable opportunity to explore different sectors of their community while enhancing their leadership skills. Partnering with Western Kentucky University provides valuable opportunities for students to gain insights into specific career fields. Professors can provide essential guidance on educational requirements and the skills necessary for success in various professions. This partnership can significantly enrich students' understanding of their future career paths and the steps they need to take to succeed. By focusing on various topics each month, such as agriculture, health services, law, and government, students gain insights into post-secondary education and career development in those fields. This kind of program not only helps students understand the various career paths available to them but also encourages them to engage with their community and develop skills that are essential for effective leadership. Visiting Frankfort, KY and Washington, D.C. as a culminating event is an excellent way to connect the students' learning about law, government, and history with their local context. These trips and tours can provide them with firsthand experience of the state's and nation's political landscape and historical significance, making their studies much more tangible.

In addition to adding a group tour to the National Postal Museum and the Arlington Cemetery while in Washington D.C. this year, we are excited to announce we've added a Non-Profit Organization Day to our schedule this school year. Historically, the program concluded with the Washington D.C. experience, which served as a culminating event that enriched the students' understanding of civic engagement and national governance. Expanding the leadership schedule in April to include a nonprofit day is a great way to highlight the importance of civic engagement and community service. This experience will not only educate students about the valuable contributions of these organizations in Franklin-Simpson but also inspire them to get involved and make a difference in their community.

The Tomorrow's Leaders program provides students with experiences that extend beyond their everyday lives in Franklin, Kentucky. Many participants have never had the opportunity to visit an airport, fly on an airplane, navigate a subway or metro system, attend a professional sporting event, or tour museums. This program fosters personal and professional development in ways that traditional classroom experiences cannot achieve. None of this would be possible without the financial support of community organizations, such as the Franklin Simpson Excellence Foundation. Your generosity plays a crucial role in making these enriching experiences accessible to our students.

B. Evaluation:

Students will engage in pre- and post-surveys regarding their college or career pathways to assess any shifts in their interests or considerations for alternative pathways influenced by their experiences over the past nine months. Additionally, we plan to track these students through graduation and for at least two years beyond that. This year, students have already expressed how their perspectives have changed or evolved based on their experiences. For instance, one senior who initially did not intend to attend Western Kentucky University or pursue a degree in Agriculture has now enrolled in WKU and is majoring in agriculture after completing the Tomorrow's Leaders program.
