


# The problem

Louisville's Postsecondary Attainment Lags Behind Peer Cities.

- Louisville's percentage of working age adults with a college degree is lower than peer cities.
- 95% of jobs created after the Great Recession required some level of college education.
- 18% of jobs requiring a H.S. diploma will pay a family -supporting wage.
- 62% of future Kentucky jobs are expected to require a college degree or training.

We're in danger of being left behind.



# The Solution:

Increase higher education access and affordability by raising private resources to leverage public financial aid and scholarship dollars.

The Evolve502 Scholarship offers every eligible JCPS graduate a two-year, tuition-free postsecondary education.

- Last dollar scholarship program, covering the gap between tuition and mandatory fees and any federal and state aid a student receives
- The scholarship can be used at any KCTCS college such as Jefferson Community and Technical College or Simmons College.
- Opportunity grants and book stipends for lowest income students
- Goal to make a vailable to classes 2021-2033





# Scholar supports and services

### **Opportunity Grants**

Students from households earnings less than \$47K annually will also be eligible for Opportunity Grants of \$1,100 per semester (maximum \$2,200 annually) to assist with non-tuition costs.

### **Success Coaches**

Provide personalized coaching for our scholars to achieve their personal and academic goals. Coaches also assist students in navigating the college environment.

### **Emergency Grants**

The Evolve502 Emergency fund was established to assist Scholars who may encounter challenging events and circumstances that may hinder their success as a student. Students may receive up to \$500 once per academic year.

# Scholarship eligibility

- Be a Kentucky resident
- Graduate from a JCPS high school
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- Earn a GED within 12 months of their original high school graduation date and meet other criteria.
- If student enrolls in military no later than 90 days after high school graduation, they may defer eligibility while in active duty.






- Over 1,000 students registered in CLH Sites

# 2023-24 Community Learning Hub Demographic Data


### Gender




# Unique Identifiers



### Race & Ethnicity




#### **Grade Levels**
