2022-2023

The Superintendent Student Advisory Council began the Transition Ready Mentorship Program to support the KCSD goal of 100% transition readiness. That year the high school students began mentoring 8th graders on 3 separate occasions.



From the start of this year all levels were included and received 5 mentoring sessions. Mentor meetings were tailored to support current needs of students at their grade levels with the last two sessions focusing on transitioning to the next level.

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2023-2024

As a way to expand upon the Transition Ready Mentorship Program it was decided that mentoring would increase to 5 total sessions while keeping the same mentee for each session to build stronger relationships. Mid-year, 8th grade mentors were added to the core team with the goal of including elementary mentees. Due to the mid-year addition, these MS to ELM sessions only took place 3 times.

During the 2024-2025 School year:

 Approximately 33 high school students mentored 246 middle schoolers.

 Approximately 61 middle school students mentored 354 elementary students.

- Explore the inclusion of 7th-grade mentors to build leadership capacity and establish longer-term mentoring relationships.
- Utilize Core Meetings to create personalized postcards for mentees, maintaining meaningful connections between sessions.
