Executive Director Update:

Assistant Director of Learning & Empowerment Interviews,

Special Education Update:

NKCES Representation at National SELS: NKCES proudly supported our outgoing DoSE Advisory Board Chair, Jodi Hall, as she attended the Special Education Legislative Summit (SELS) in Washington, D.C. Jodi was joined by Misti Carr, the new DoSE for Covington Independent Schools. Together, they represented Northern Kentucky with pride and purpose, advocating for students with disabilities and engaging with federal policymakers on key issues impacting special education.

Owen County Strategic Planning Collaboration: Regional DoSE Brittney Howell joined forces with Dr. Robb Smith, Dr. Amy Razor, Dr. Kim Webb, and Mrs. Emily Giles to lead Owen County Schools through a comprehensive strategic planning process. This work focused on refining the district's mission, vision, and core values, and ensuring alignment with their Profile of a Learner. The ultimate goal is to support systems that foster high-performing, inclusive environments, moving us closer to the NKCES vision of "creating a world yet to be."

Conscious Discipline Institute Participation: This summer, Emily Borchers and Annie Wheatcraft attended the Conscious Discipline Institute in Louisville, KY. This is a week-long, immersive professional learning experience designed to transform educator mindsets and practices. Conscious Discipline is an adults-first, research-based approach that promotes self-regulation, connection, and resilience. Through intensive training, Mrs. Borchers and Mrs. Wheatcraft learned strategies to foster emotional wellness, conflict resolution, and composure in both educators and students. These skills will help create safe,



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supportive, and high-performing inclusive environments across NKCES districts, reinforcing our commitment to whole-child development and strong, positive relationships.

SERTAC Summer Planning and Back-to-School Preparation: June was a pivotal month for the SERTAC team, as consultants focused on strategic planning and coordination to prepare for an impactful start to the school year. The team developed regional and district-level trainings scheduled for July and August, ensuring schools are equipped with high-quality professional learning and resources to support inclusive practices and student success across Northern Kentucky.

Learning and Empowerment Team:

Northern Kentucky Institute for Arts Education (NKIAE):

In June, Joe Bertucci attended the Americans for the Arts Conference, connecting with local and national partners in support of arts education. In July, Mr. Bertucci met with district leaders from Boone and Campbell County School Districts to discuss best practices in addressing Kentucky's Academic Standards for Visual and Performing Arts. During the week of July 21-25, Mr. Bertucci led five days of professional learning for more than 180 teachers from 19 districts in a series of workshops supporting arts education and arts integration.

Northern Kentucky Institute for Strategic Prevention (NKISP):

Throughout June and July, prevention efforts remained robust and collaborative. In June, NKISP submitted the Q2 Quarterly Performance Report to SAMHSA. June also brought a combined Steering Committee and NKISP Institute Meeting featuring guest speaker Stephanie Armbrister Strutner, presenting on effective partner engagement. Staff engaged with key partners—including NorthKey, CCDFA, NKY ASAP, and the American Heart Association—to plan youth programming and support regional initiatives. Additionally, final reporting was completed for the Activating Youth Voice grant, and planning is underway for two upcoming professional learning events in August focused on substance use prevention and education.

School-Based Mental Health (SBMH) and Trauma-Informated School Services (TISS):

The SBMH and TISS teams have remained actively engaged in supporting trauma-informed practices and mental wellness across the region. This summer, the SBMH and TISS team led district leaders through participation in a book study on *Trauma-Sensitive Leadership* to deepen their understanding of creating resilient, supportive school cultures. In July, the SBMH and TISS teams, in collaboration with other NKCES departments, hosted a successful two-day regional training, "Chaos to Confidence," focused on building conditions for success in schools. The training featured three tailored pathways—for administrators, experienced teachers, and newer teachers—ensuring targeted support for all roles and serving over 50 educators. TISS and SBMH teams are now preparing for upcoming district-level trainings in August to continue strengthening trauma-informed systems and mental health supports in the 2025 school year.

Learning Acceleration:

The Learning Acceleration Specialists (LAS) team launched the 2025–2026 Sprouting New Teachers cohort, welcoming 15 enthusiastic new teachers representing six districts. This cohort aims to provide targeted support, mentorship, and professional learning to early-career educators throughout the upcoming school year. In addition, the LAS team hosted a dynamic two-day Literacy Camp, serving over 30 educators who teach grades 3–12. The LAS team provided two days of regional OpenSciED training to

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build capacity in high-quality science instruction. The LAS team also collaborated with other NKCES departments to support the successful Chaos to Confidence regional training in June. LAS is currently deep into planning for individualized district training set to begin in August.
