The Kentucky Board of Education (KBE) held day two of its regular meeting on August 7, 2025. The KBE met both virtually and in-person at the Paul Sawyier Public Library, 319 Wapping Street, Frankfort KY. Members of the public were permitted to attend the meeting in person although encouraged to view the meeting on the Kentucky Department of Education's (KDE) Media Portal. The board conducted the following business:

I. Call to Order

Chair Sharon Robinson welcomed all board members and guests to the meeting. The meeting was called to order at 10:30 A.M. ET.

II. Roll Call

Chair Robinson asked for a roll call of members. The following members were present: Holly Bloodworth, Harold McKinney, Juston Pate, Julie Pile, Randy Poe, Sharon Robinson, Lee Todd, Steve Trimble, Diane Woods, Lu Young, and Harper Blake. Alfonson De Torres Núñez, Secretary Jamie Link, and President Aaron Thompson were absent.

IV. Board Member Sharing

Chair Sharon Robinson said that the next item on the agenda is board sharing. It is an opportunity for board members to raise issues, pose questions, share concerns, and suggest topics to include on future board meeting agendas. Julie Pile began by giving an update on the KBE Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child Subcommittee. Pile said that they recently held a meeting which discussed the issue of chronic absenteeism. Juston Pate gave an update on the National Association of State Boards of Education (NASBE) High School Transformation Network. He said that Kentucky's team hopes to have their first meeting in September. Diane Woods shared that she was able to visit the new Hub for Innovative Learning and Leadership (HILL) technical school in Lexington, KY. Lu Young shared that she was able to attend the SREB (Southern Regional

Education Board) Making Schools Work conference in New Orleans, Louisiana to discuss the work of the Kentucky United We Learn initiative. Vice Chair Young also said she attended the annual Education Commission of the States National Forum on Education Policy in Salt Lake City, Utah. Chair Robinson closed board sharing by emphasizing the importance of preparing graduates for the workforce.

Chair Robinson said that "KDE staff identified items in the consent agenda as those that are non-controversial in nature. Consent Agenda Items D through N are requests for certification of the noted administrative regulations to avoid expiration. All of these regulations are currently in effect and nearing their 7-year expiration date. Staff have reviewed these regulations and determined they should be certified to remain in effect. If the regulations are not certified, they will expire and become ineffective."

Chair Robinson remarked that the consent agenda items were distributed to members in advance of the meeting for review, however, if an item is moved, the chair may decide to take up the matter immediately or move it to a discussion item later in the agenda. None of the items were moved and Chair Robinson asked for a motion to approve the consent agenda. The motion was made by Lee Todd and seconded by Harold McKinney. The motion passed unanimously with a voice vote.

VIII. Action/Discussion Items

A. Report on State Schools Committee on Action/Discussion Items

State Schools Committee Chair Randy Poe provided an update on the committee's meeting. Poe shared that the committee took action on several annual regulatory items for the Kentucky School for the Blind (KSB), Kentucky School for the Deaf (KSD) and the Area Technology Centers (ATCs). Chair Robinson called for a motion to adopt the committee's recommendations and approve the Annual Policy Adoptions and Amendments for the Kentucky School for the Blind (KSB) and Kentucky School for the Deaf (KSD), KSB Advisory Board Member Appointment, KSB and KSD Traceable Communication Systems, Annual Amendments to Area Technology Center (ATC) Policies and Procedures, Annual Amendments to the KY Tech Student Handbook, and Office of Career and Technical Education Traceable Communication System. The motion did not require a second as it came from the committee. The motion passed unanimously with a voice vote.

B. Report on United We Learn/Teaching and Learning Committee on Action/Discussion Items

United We Learn Committee Chair Holly Bloodworth provided an update on the committee's meeting. Bloodworth shared that the committee heard from KDE Chief Academic Officer Micki Ray Marinelli and KDE Director of Early Literacy Christie Biggerstaff regarding the implementation of Senate Bill (SB) 9 (2022), the Read to Succeed Act.

IX. Review Items

A. KDE Strategic Plan Update

KDE Chief Performance Officer Karen Dodd and KDE Strategic Data Analyst Leslie McKinney presented the results of the most recent employee survey administered by the department in June and an update on the KDE Strategic Plan. Dodd and McKinney said that report summarizes findings from qualitative, open-ended survey responses associated with the 2025 Frankfort-based Employee Satisfaction Survey, which was used to gather insights on key issues and experiences. The presenters shared that detailed, actionable reports were shared with each Kentucky Department of

Education (KDE) office and included more granular insights, while maintaining confidentiality.

B. Presentation of the 2025 Grissom Award for Innovation in Special Education

Commissioner Robbie Fletcher and KBE Chair Sharon Robinson facilitated the award presentation. Each year, the KBE grants this award to a Kentuckian or a Kentucky organization to honor outstanding dedication to improving achievement for students with disabilities. The winners of the award were announced to be Kimberly Chevalier from Jefferson County Schools and the Bridges Program at Mary G. Hogsett Primary School. Commissioner Fletcher offered his congratulations to the recipients and thanked them for their commitment to the students of Kentucky.

XI. Action/Discussion Items (Cont.)

A. Approval of 701 KAR 5:170 and 701 KAR 5:170E, Waiver Requests

KDE Deputy Commissioner and General Counsel Todd G. Allen and KDE Deputy General Counsel Corey Nichols presented the item. Allen and Nichols explained that through June 26, 2025, Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 156.160(2) provided that local boards of education and school councils may request the KBE waive any administrative regulation promulgated by the KBE. This waiver process was set forth in KRS 156.120(2) and no administrative regulation was necessary related to the waiver process. Through June 26, 2025, when KDE received a waiver request pursuant to KRS 156.160(2), it was reviewed by the program area with authority over the subject matter to be waived, and a recommendation was made to the KBE regarding approval. However, the waiver authority in KRS 156.160(2) has been removed from statute and replaced with updated waiver authority. During its 2025 ordinary session, the Kentucky General Assembly passed Senate Bill (SB) 207, which, among other things, removed the waiver process previously set forth in KRS 156.120(2) and created a new statute related to KBE waivers. SB 207 (2025) is contained at KRS 156.161. Allen and Nichols proposed to establish procedures for processing requests to the Kentucky Board of Education (KBE) to waive statutes and administrative regulations. Chair Robinson called for a motion to approve 701 KAR 5:170 and 701 KAR 5:170E, Waiver Requests. The motion was made by Steve Trimble and seconded by Randy Poe. The motion passed with a voice vote.

B. Amendments to 703 KAR 5:280, School Improvement Procedures

KDE Associate Commissioner Kelly Foster, Ed.D., and KDE Policy Advisor Matthew Courtney, Ed.D., presented the proposed amendments. Following a discussion with the full board, Chair Robinson called for a motion to approve the amendments to 703 KAR 5:280, School Improvement Procedures. The motion was made by Harold McKinney and seconded by Holly Bloodworth. The motion passed with a voice vote.

C. Amendment to 704 KAR 3:440, Primary school program guidelines

Deputy Commissioner Thomas Tucker, Ph.D., KDE Chief Academic Officer Micki Ray Marinelli, and KDE Policy Advisor Sarah Medley presented the proposed amendments. Following a discussion with the full board, Chair Robinson called for a motion to approve the amendments to 704 KAR 3:440, Primary school program guidelines. The motion was made by Diane Woods and seconded by Julie Pile. The motion passed with a voice vote.

D. Kentucky Minimum Specifications for School Buses

KDE Associate Commissioner Matt Ross, KDE Division Director Chay Ritter, and KDE Branch Manager Roger Banks presented the Kentucky Minimum Specifications for School Buses. Following a discussion with the full board, Chair Robinson called for a motion to approve the 2026 Kentucky Minimum Specifications for School Buses. The motion was made by Lu Young and seconded by Lee Todd. The motion passed with a voice vote.

E. Kentucky Education Technology Systems (KETS) Operational Plan for School Year 2025-2026

KDE Associate Commissioner David Couch, KDE Division Director Mike Leadingham, and KDE Chief Digital Officer Marty Park presented the operational plan. The presenters explained that this item is to approve the use of Kentucky Education Technology System (KETS) funds in the amount of \$15.4 million for the 2025-2026 school year. Couch noted that the KBE had already approved the annual KY K-12 education technology priorities and needs as part of the KETS Master Plan for Education Technology for School Year (SY) 2024-2030 in March 2024 as a document incorporated by reference to 701 KAR 5:110. Since 1992, the KBE has been required, by statute, to approve KETS funds as one of the annual funding sources to help address the annual KY K-12 education technology (EdTech) needs. Chair Robinson called for a motion to approve the KETS operational management resources of \$15.4 million for the 2025-2026 school year. The

motion was made by Lee Todd and seconded by Julie Pile. The motion passed with a voice vote.

Chair Robinson thanked everyone for their time and asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. The motion was made by Steve Trimble and seconded by Harold McKinney. The motion passed with a voice vote. The meeting was adjourned at 2:21 P.M. E.T.
