- We have had the financial audit team in the district and are continuing to provide them the necessary documents to complete our financial audit.
- The middle school gym is being painted and flooring is supposed to come in this weekend. The HVAC in that gym is giving us some difficulty so Mr. Brewer is working on that.
- The roofing company has made at least two visits recently to our buildings and are preparing to do the work.
- WKU came Monday to begin work on the mesonet station
- My first meeting on the Superintendent Advisory Council with the Commissioner is next Wednesday.

#### X. Informational Items

#### A. Personnel Report

HR Director David Lyons approved the attached personnel report.

**B.** Letter from Office of Education Accountability Regarding Athletic Director Hire

Superintendent Wasson shared with the Board a letter from W. Bryan Jones, Acting Deputy Director of the Office of Education Accountability (OEA) regarding the hiring of the Athletic Director. OEA received a complaint that the athletic director position for the high school was not properly advertised to find the best candidate. The letter explains that this position was not a high school position but actually a district position. The OEA determined that the district-wide athletic director's duties are not extensive enough to constitute a full-time position and therefore the position is treated as an extra duty. Since they are extra-duty assignments, the district is not subject to posting and advertising requirements of certified positions.

The resolution line of the letter states: There being no violation of education law or policy, there is no need for resolution.

## C. Federal Funding

Assistant Superintendent Tiffany Anderson presented the federal funds that the district receives. She spoke of the following supplemental programs from which we receive federal funds:

Title I- \$1,988,313 for academic achievement of disadvantaged

Title II Part A- \$129,042 for supporting effective instruction

Title V- \$67,311 for rural education achievement

Title IV- \$87,230 for student support and academic enrichment for safe and healthy schools and well rounded education.

Perkins- \$41,170 for High School CTE Programs

IDEA & Preschool IDEA- \$644,542 for students with special needs

#### **D.** Tax Rate Presentation

Superintendent Wasson presented information to the public on the tax rate proposal. The nickel tax is a term used to describe a tax that generates 5 cents per \$100 of assessed property value. These funds can only be used for facility improvements. The state generates the exact rate that a district must implement for the nickel tax, and for Powell County that is 5.8 cents. With almost \$50,000,000 of unmet need outlined in the District Facility Plan and the opportunity for the funds to be equalized by the state generating 150% of the state's assessment per child, the District needs these funds to be able to improve facilities throughout the district including athletic facilities.

Superintendent Wasson shared that the cost for property assessed at \$100,000 would be \$58.00 per year or \$4.83 per month. The funds brought in by this tax go directly into the local restricted funds to be utilized for building projects in our district. There are other funds provided by the state through an equalization match and through the SEEK formula. It was noted this tax does not affect motor vehicle or utility tax.

Superintendent Wasson shared that the number of nickels a district needs varies by district and by the district needs. The first nickel that Powell County implemented allowed enough funds to be able to build a new elementary school as well as complete many other projects for the district. It was shared that there are two ways to generate this nickel. One is by increasing taxes by the 5 cents per \$100 assessed property value and the other is to take additional money out of general fund to put in the building fund in the amount of a nickel. It was explained that in Powell County we have bond payments in the amount of approximately \$380,000 annually that we have to pay out of general fund now, so taking additional funds out of general fund would make funding general fund projects difficult.

Assistant Superintendent Tiffany Anderson made a presentation on what ESSER dollars were spent on because there were questions on why the district did not spend more ESSER money during the pandemic on facilities. She explained that the majority of the funds went to staffing for additional help to prevent learning loss. Many of the dollars also went to food service and transportation costs related to serving meals to families while they were restricted at home. Additionally, Assistant Superintendent Anderson explained that ESSER monies were restricted to what they could be used for and we were not allowed to use them for athletic facilities or building projects unless a need could be tied to the pandemic and for the types of projects that were needed in our district we couldn't do that. If we had done that, the federal

government would then own part of that facility and some districts have been asked to pay money back for things they were not allowed to spend the money on.

Superintendent Wasson shared pictures of the projects that have been completed with our current building funds including the new elementary school and the middle school gym wall. There are other projects in the planning stages with money set aside to complete them such as new roofs at the middle and high school, an HVAC project in the district, and security vestibules at Bowen and Clay City Elementary. She then shared pictures of a master plan that was created showing where we could put a baseball and softball field and the need to move the softball field in order to fix the football field and expand the track.

The nickel tax would increase our bonding potential from a little over \$6 million to over \$21 million if the state legislature agrees to equalize the revenue generated by the nickel. The state contributions have made significant impact to the district in the last 5 years with the projects that we have been able to complete.

Superintendent Wasson also shared that this is not all about athletic fields, but the reason athletic fields have taken so long to renovate is because prior to 2022 districts could not use building funds on athletic facilities. In 2022, the legislature enacted HB 678 allowing districts to prioritize their needs in the way they saw fit and then that bill was extended in 2024 to allow district choice until June of 2027. Superintendent Wasson came to the district in the fall of 2022 and worked to fix the safety and security issues and roofing and HVAC issues in the district as well as building a new school in these first three years. She shared that with all these big projects underway or planned with finances set aside, it is time to get the athletic facility work underway before the June 2027 deadline of being able to prioritize our needs the way the district determines is best.

It was pointed out at the end of the presentation that this tax is not just athletic facility improvements, but for any continuing needs of facilities in our district. Improving district facilities attracts families and business to the area and enhances the overall appeal and economic health of our community. Our schools are community hubs and are used for both times of disaster and times of enjoyment. Our students deserve improved facilities so they can continue to learn and grow and participate in extracurricular activities that help shape them into well rounded individuals who will contribute to our community or the world in the future.

#### **XI.** Public Comments

Members of the public asked questions about the presentation and Superintendent Wasson answered them. People spoke both for and against increasing the tax rate.
