

A Day in the Life of a School Secretary

- Open School Office
- Begin collecting employee absences and preparing classroom coverages with substitutes or other staff
- Answer phone calls from parents/ staff/ administration
- Sign in late students, enroll new students and welcome families, provide bus transportation information, andschedule new students
- Work on payroll

- Lunch
- Make afternoon transportation changes
- Work on school correspondence, emails, and JCPS and/or State reports
- Help sign students out for early dismissal
- Make sure all afternoon staff duty is covered for those who are absent
- Phone calls, emails, closing of office for the day




According to the National Education Association, 1 in 5 educators work second jobs to make ends meet.


1 in 3 early career educators work second jobs to make ends meet.



"The pay penalty for teachers—the gap between the weekly wages of teachers and college graduates working in other professions—grew to a record 26.4% in 2022, a significant increase from 6.1% in 1996. "

"Although teachers tend to receive better benefits packages than other professionals do, this advantage is not large enough to offset the growing wage penalty for teachers."

"On average, teachers earned 73.6 cents for every dollar that other professionals made in 2022. This is much less than the 93.9 cents on the dollar they made in 1996"

Teacher Pay Remains 20% Less Than 2008 Despite Small Gain in 2025 School Year



In addition to making less than similarly educated peers, we are NOT IMMUNE to the statewide trend, and we too, are making less than we used to, by nearly20%.

We do A LOT- more than folks realize-our jobs are hard and really stressful.

We make far less than our similarly educated peersthis makes recruiting difficult.

Our Buying Power is decreasing, FAST-this makes retention difficult.
