

Walton-Verona Elementary School Council Report for Board of Education 9-25-19

- Month 1 is in the books and we are rolling full steam ahead! Our youngest students are doing a great job to acclimating to the school through support from their teachers as well as our guidance counselor, Jessica Iles, through character lessons and the teaching of our Big 3 Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be Ready to Learn. Our older students are doing a great job of setting the example. Something new to the Big 3 is something called a Big 3 VIP, which we started implementing somewhat last year, and we've added it full-time to our Big 3 repertoire for this year. This is when a student goes above and beyond the Big 3 through showing tremendous responsibility, a great act of kindness, or many other things that blow us away. These students automatically get to sit at the Big 3 lunch table on Friday, plus they get to bring a friend with them.
- We had our first AR Night, Camp-Read-A-Lot, on September 10th. These are always great event to connect with the community, and it's a fantastic way to promote reading. For this AR night, we broke a record! We had 282 students come out with their families to read books, to take AR tests and to generally have a wonderful time. The former record was 260 students, which was set last school year at the Halloween AR Night. Our next AR Night is on October 29th and runs 6:00 to 7:30. The PTA will also be hosting their annual Trunk or Treat in the bus loop on that evening immediately before the event (5:30 6:00). All of this will coincide with our Book Fair that is taking place that week as well.
- The PTA sponsored Fall Festival took place on Friday, Sept. 20th. While it's difficult to get an actual head count, it's safe to say we approached 1,000, if not more, folks coming to our campus, making this the largest event we host at our school for the year. The event ran very smoothly through the coordination of the PTA, school administration, and our School Resource Officer, which resulted in a very fun and safe evening. The proceeds from this event directly support our teachers and our students, and it is without a doubt one of the events that makes WVES special. I had many parents, teachers, and community members mention how great of event it was, and this can only be attributed to the hard work from our PTA, faculty, staff and many volunteers.
- The Fall MAP testing window has closed and teachers are using data from that ensure students are being met where they are in both reading and math. Much of this work is being done in PLC's, which meet regularly on Tuesdays. Teachers are working with students on tracking their own learning and creating growth goals, creating a culture of self-efficacy and student ownership. Classroom and hallway displays can be seen throughout the building showing where students started the school year out on reading and math. As the school year continues, students will track their own personal growth as well as watch how their class grows through the use of these displays, which will be updated after our Winter and Spring MAP testing.
- Mr. Patterson and Mr. Colin (as the kids call him) will begin scheduling observations with teachers in the next week. Walkthroughs are also being conducted where the focus is on collecting data on student engagement.
 Mrs. Gregg will also be participating in the walkthroughs.
- The SBDM Council meeting for September took place on the 18th. One of the primary focuses of the meeting
 was to plan for upcoming parent conferences, which will take place at the end of October and/or the beginning
 of November.



MAP Data - Fall 2019

Attached is a copy of the Fall MAP to KPREP Predictor information. This information compares students' performance on Fall 2019 MAP scores to performance on Spring 2019 KPREP. The first table is All Students; the 2nd table is Free/Reduced Lunch Program Students; the 3rd table is Students w/ Disabilities.

Social-Emotional Learning Program

After meeting with our leadership team throughout the school year, we decided there was a great need for social emotional learning at the middle school level. After attending multiple professional development opportunities, exploring the CASEL document, consulting with other local school districts, and testing multiple curricula, it became evident that the Second Step Middle School Program was going to be the best fit for our school.

The Second Step Middle School Program helps early adolescent students cope with challenges, create and maintain positive relationships, and succeed both socially and academically. The engaging lessons equip students with the mindsets, knowledge, and skills they need to handle strong emotions, make and follow through on good decisions, and create strong friendships while avoiding or deescalating peer conflicts.

We are on week 5 of implementation at this point, and the program is now running smoothly. Every teacher in the school has their own section of 10-20 students (with the exception of 8th grade). After first period every Friday, students report to their SEL groups where they are offered an opportunity to build meaningful relationships with their teacher and smaller group of classmates. The lessons last thirty minutes. So far, students have had lessons on bullying (5th grade), helping new students, growth mindset, and embracing challenges. Throughout the remainder of the year, we will spend our time discussing "values and friendships," "thoughts emotions, and decisions," and "serious peer conflict." The feedback we have received from students and teachers has been positive as we grow and adapt this important part of our week at Walton-Verona Middle School.

WVHS School Board Report September 2019

On Friday, August 16th, WVHS hosted The Academic and Attendance Award Ceremony. Students were recognized on overall GPA standing upon conclusion of the 2018-19 school year. Students with perfect attendance during the 2018-19 school year were also recognized. One-hundred and eighty-six sophomores, juniors and seniors were invited to this award ceremony. This represents 49% of those classes who were recognized for either academics or perfect attendance. Seniors in the Class of 2019 were awarded their Academic letters or Academic chevrons at graduation practice.

On Wednesday, September 11th, Sarah Hester hosted a KHEAA presentation for parents of juniors and seniors. The session covered information regarding paying for college including, scholarships, grants, and filling out the FAFSA. Approximately fifteen parents were in attendance. A follow up session will be offered to all seniors and their parents on Wednesday, October 2nd. The title of this workshop is "FAFSA Completion Workshop." The goal of this workshop is for all families to complete and submit their FAFSA application before leaving the computer lab.

All seniors who have not met benchmarks on the ACT have met one-on-one with Mrs. Hester. Interested students are participating in seminar extensions in either English or Reading. The English, Math and Science departments will be offering targeted boot camps for these seniors who register for either the October or December ACT. All students who meet benchmark due to their October or December ACT scores will have the opportunity to adjust their second semester schedule for those courses in which they reach benchmark.

Congratulations to all of our sports teams who have qualified for the All A state tournaments! Our Girls Golf, Boys Golf, Volleyball and Girls Soccer have all represented WVHS at All A state tournaments.

All students viewed video presentations on the Supply Chain Industry and the Construction Industry. Students who expressed interest in either industry will be going to the Supply Chain Expo and/or the Construction Industry Expo during the month of October. Both events will be held at our school, with representatives from various businesses speaking about opportunities available to our students. We have twenty-nine students interested in the Supply Chain Industry and twenty-two students interested in the Construction Industry.






