


Walton-Verona Elementary School Council Report for Board of Education 10-24-19

- The first quarter is complete, and report cards will be sent home on Friday, October 25, giving us our first look at grades. This in combination with MAP data and KPREP, and will help us identify students that will benefit from ESS, which will be starting very soon. We are also starting Parent-Teacher Conferences, which will take place over the next few weeks. For this year, the teachers have been provided the opportunity to create their own flexible schedule of conferences where the teacher will schedule conferences at a time that works for both the teacher and the parent. This may include meetings before school, after school, or during the teacher's planning time. We will not be having a 'one night' conference event like in the past. We hope this will help those parents that work different shifts to be able to meet with their student's teacher, giving us an overall better, more meaningful turnout for conferences.
- Our first quarter's RTI/RTA numbers are in as we monitor students who need remedial
 help in reading and math. Our grade-level teams of teachers meet regularly with our
 remediation specialists to determine the specific help the students need as well as
 determining the best plan of action to enusre they receive that help. As students
 progress, they are monitored regularly to determine if the help they are receiving
 is effective in closing the gaps in their reading and/or math. We have 117
 students identified for reading and 82 identified for math and with only one math
 interventionist, one reading/RTA interventionist and one aide, our teachers had

- to be pretty creative in finding ways to make sure they were helping every student. We recently had the addition of extra help in helping close these gaps through the approval of an ESS daytime waiver, giving us an extra person to work with these students. This enables us to work in smaller groups, targeting the specific skill deficits that different students have.
- This week is KY Safe Schools Week where each day students will hear a lesson on being SAFE (Strong, Awesome, Friendly, & Encouraging) in school over the morning announcements as well as receive in class lessons from our guidance counselor. We will also be having Bus Safety lessons on Oct. 23 with all of our students.
- The following week is Red Ribbon Week as well as Spirit Week, which our PTA helps with. Each day will have a message about staying drug-free and will also have a theme. Tuesday will be our PTA Trunk or Treat in the bus loop from 5:30 to 6:00, which is immediately followed by our Halloween themed AR Night, which runs 6:00 to 7:30. This is typically a very heavily attended AR Night we may be looking at another record-breaker. The Book Fair will also be taking place during this week and will be open during AR Night.
- Our STEM lab recently received a major upgrade through a generous donation from our PTA. We now have a class set of 30 Chromebooks as well as a charging cart. Not only will this will help our students explore and learn more about STEM (which accounts for 26% of the ES Accountability Score), but will also be a huge help for benchmarking and progress monitoring our students in reading and math.
- Our Threat Assessment Team recently met where we reviewed and updated our procedures and documents. We now have in place a documented reintegration plan should the need arise.
- Our FRYSC coordinators worked with the Big Smiles mobile dental unit to have students receive dental services
 here at school, thus eliminating the need to miss school for a dentist visit. Big Smiles estimates that 149 school
 days were saved through 71 kids being seen by a dentist (46 received teeth cleaning, 17 received sealants and
 22 received restorative care).

Classroom Walks


- WVMS Administration and others have been conducting regular classroom walk-throughs throughout the first quarter.



Board Report October 24, 2019

- Our School Security and Safety Committee held its first meeting on Monday, October 7. We looked at Domains 2 Security, Crime, and Violence Prevention Policies and Procedures and Domain 3 Physical Security Measures of the self-assessment rubric.
- Mrs. Nesmith and Mr. Nash visited the Boone County Area Technical Center over Fall Break to meet with and thank all the instructors, support staff and Mrs. Williams (Principal) to thank them for their role in earning a 5-Star school rating.
 - o All programs at the ATC offer dual credit courses and career certifications
 - Machine Tool and Health Occupations Career Ready "Bonus" for Career areas in High Demand.
- School representatives from Bell County High School visited WVHS on Thursday of Fall Break to gain insight into our programs and offerings for students as a result of WVHS 5-Star rating. (Met with Beechwood the following day).
 - We shared areas we thought played a key role: Career Readiness, Data Desegregation, On-Demand Preparations, Student Celebrations, Staff Appreciation and Parent Communications
- Of the 134 students in the senior class, 86 are currently transition ready.
 - o We are continuing to offer Seminar Extensions for ACT preparation
 - Students are enrolled in their 3rd CTE class and will take End-Of-Program and career certifications
 - Seniors will prepare for the KYOTE test in Math, Reading and English after the December ACT is offered.
- Mrs. Nesmith and Mr. Nash updated all data sheets for ACT performance over the last 12 years.
 - o 2018-19 Juniors' showed a small dip in ACT English scores
 - o 2018-19 Juniors' Math ACT scope dipped below 20 for the first time since 2017-08
 - o 2018-19 Juniors' Reading Scores continue to climb and show growth over time
 - \circ 2018-19 Junior's Science scores were the 2nd highest in 12 years except for the Juniors who took the 2017-18 ACT


