Questions/Comments

Table 1

- Will Liberty no longer be considered a school, but rather a program?
- If satellite locations did not work for Newcomer, then how would this be successful for Liberty?
- Students at both schools have high levels of needs.
- Option 2 keeps students together.
- Continuity with option 2 provides follow-up for students as they progress.
- Satellites diminish school ownership.
- What plans would be put into place to address/accommodate the culture/climate of Liberty if placed in multiple sites?
- How do we identify students for placement with satellites?
- Satellites bring challenges to scheduling to meet the needs of students. Options are reduced.
- Logistically, programs could not be provided at the same levels if satellites at Liberty.
- At South Park, Fairdale would be available for CTE.
- What happens to Mary Ryan?
- Transitions during eighth grade are a challenge due to the number of high school credits earned potentially in eighth grade. Where do students go if this happens?
- What about ISC?

Table 2

- Option 1
 - Destruction of program, its continuity, and culture
 - Returning students to schools where they did not experience success
 - Students chose the alternative setting.
 - Concern about becoming a "dumping ground"
 - Becomes a program, not a school
 - O What about Mary Ryan?
 - The schools are codependent.
 - Limits enrollment/growth
 - Acceleration options are lost.
 - Staffing challenges/cost
 - Address change constantly
 - Nonviable if the school remains
 - Will ESL outgrow the Liberty facility?
 - Will the building meet the needs of LHS? (South Park TAPP)

- Can Breckinridge MHS be considered for Liberty?
- Option 2
 - O What about Mary Ryan?
 - School stays together.
- Option 2
 - o The culture, mission, and vision are intact.
 - Continuity stays in place.
 - o Preferred over option 1
 - The clientele will change; the trend and location will stay consistent.

- Option 1
 - Many students come from Iroquois and Shawnee—would lose "fresh start."
 - It's hard to build school culture when spread over three sites. (We would be creating what is currently a problem with ESL.)
 - Would have a 17-year-old ninth grader in the same location with an 11-year-old sixth grader
 - o Community services would be more difficult to coordinate at three sites.
- Option 2
 - All students in one location
 - o Is close to home a true option?
 - o No gym
 - Limited TARC
 - Is there another underutilized building that would accommodate Liberty in a better location?

- Option 1
 - Concerns—Students from the existing schools (Iroquois, Shawnee) will not have a "fresh start."
 - Why do for Liberty the same thing that doesn't work for ESL?
- Option 2
 - o Needs to be in one location
 - Separate locations will prohibit building Liberty's culture.
- Suggestions
 - Build the Liberty program; enroll more students.
 - o Find a location (other than Liberty) where ESL can grow.
- Option 3
 - Build on existing property to house Liberty or ESL.

- Fairdale transportation issue
- Adults with children (e.g.,20-year-old with 12-/13-year-old)
- o Divide resources.
- Are other facilities options (Brown-Forman) corrected to (Brown-Mackie)?
- o Sharing facilities creates problems for alternative students.
- Students have conversation with adults.
